GAME DAY: WHERE MEN GROW TOGETHER by Bob Drake

Saturday morning, April 23, will mark the 13th annual men's game day event. Only in 2020 did we miss the event, and that was due to Covid.

This year, our **guest leader** will be **Pastor Walter Hooker** from Bellevue Christian Church and affectionately known as Hook. He's a longtime friend of West Hills and was the guest leader for the first two Game Day events in 2008 and 2009 and a third time in 2018.

Pastor Hooker returns this year to lead us on a biblical journey seeking ways to live in harmony with people different from us.

History shows the race schism in some form, and in almost every country in the world, dates back thousands of years. And our country is certainly a part of that history. Moreover, the universal church has been complicit in allowing this to happen.

Racism between people who are different in some way is a horrible thing that we sometimes see projected in violent ways. In my time in North Omaha, through visits with people of color who have become friends, I've learned about a more devastating form of racism. Something I call "Silent Racism." It is buried in the hearts of mankind. It sneaks out, does horrible harm, and then goes back into hiding.

Let me give you an example. I sometimes read the advice column in the newspaper. A couple of years back, a woman wrote in asking for ideas on how to explain to her two young children about the actions of an uncle. They were all at a family gathering, and the uncle was talking about how the week before he had interviewed people for a job opening. One of the candidates was a woman who had all the qualifications: good training and good experience. But he didn't hire her because he didn't want to work with a black person. Sadly, those kinds of events abound in our society. They're hidden in the heart, and no man-made law can change them.

My 17 years as a West Hills mission team member and coordinator with North Omaha partners have convinced me that all the laws, rules, and regulations will not stop this ugly practice because they deal with expressions of racism, not the cause. No more! Pastor Hooker will guide us in an interactive conversation, based on biblical direction, to discover how we, the children of God, can celebrate our differences.

The only way racism can be overcome is when mankind's hearts are changed. People of different backgrounds meet, get to know each other, and slowly build friendships where dialogue and understanding can occur.

CONVERSATION - It's the only way racism will ever be defeated.

The Game Day format will be a little different this year. We will meet in the Fellowship Hall. Pastor Hooker will mix teaching with questions for discussion by each table group. This will allow for feedback and comments for all to hear on important questions that may arise. That will take up the first half of the morning. After a short break, we'll adjourn to the sanctuary for an open Q&A with Pastor Hooker moderating. This move will enable final lunch preparations.

HOW WILL YOU RESPOND WHEN CALLED UPON? by Cindy Mielke

"How do you reconcile with a God you fear?" At first, I wasn't sure what the young man said to me. Then I heard him repeat the question: "How do you reconcile with a God you fear?" I had been browsing through brochures near the reception desk at St. Benedict Center in Schuyler, Nebraska. It was the second night of the women's silent retreat held in February. Dinner had ended for the evening, and the center was quiet—I was one of two people in the lobby area.

After hearing a voice from behind me ask this question twice, I turned around and saw a young man sitting in one of the chairs near the gift shop. He looked right at me, and I asked him if he was talking to me. He replied that he was—that there was no one else around to ask his question to,

and he wanted to know and asked me again: "How do you reconcile with a God you fear?"

My first thought was that I was supposed to be silent, but at that moment I felt called to walk over to him and sit down next to him. My next thought was that

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maybe I wasn't qualified to answer his question, but I started talking to him. From my heart, I told him that I don't fear God–I have an awe and reverence for God, but not fear.

He proceeded to share with me that he was afraid of God and that he felt unworthy of God's love. He had been raised by his grandmother when his mother became a drug addict. His father wasn't in his life, and he shared that his grandmother turned her head to abuse in the family directed at him. At that moment, I felt very unqualified to help him and began to think about finding someone else from our group or a monk to talk with him.

I told him that I could only imagine how hard that must have been because I wouldn't be able to understand—I had not experienced that in my life. I shared that our parents and caregivers are not perfect in their love for us the way God is. I told him I believed that when we are in difficult situations, God is there with us even if he doesn't remove the pain of those situations. I also shared that we are all worthy of God's love, that He sees us in a wholeness we can't even imagine, and loves all parts of us. I told him stories of the people God has put in the path of my life—some I could see clearly at the time—others only later as examples of His love for me working through others.

We talked for a few more minutes as he shared that friends had sent him to St. Benedict Center with some books and a list of Bible verses to

read and study. I told him that I believed those friends were gifts from God. As we spoke, he started to recite some scripture and then reference a book he was reading. He was very much in his head about everything as he was searching for answers. He then said that based on

what he had read, combined with what I had said and witnessed in my life, he understood that he had nothing to fear. He stood up and said, "You've answered my question. Thank you." And as quickly as our encounter began, it ended as he walked away.

I wasn't sure if I said or did the right things. But I suddenly realized the gift I had been given. My silence was broken to allow me to do something I had not ever been called on to do before that night—share my witness of God's love with another soul searching for God. I hope God was pleased with me. My faith journey is far from advanced, but I spoke from what I know in my heart. I pray that young man finds peace on his journey.

Last month The Window highlighted several couples from our church who shared their "story" with us. In keeping with West Hills' goal of building relationships this year, we are offering the following stories from single and widow/ widower members of our church.

Rhonda M. Hall shared that she grew up in a



"mixed family" of Catholics and Methodists, saying, "it's never been about religion, but always about faith." Arguments within the church the family had been attending brought them to West Hills. Rhonda shared the attraction

at West Hills was encouraging one's involvement in politics "but not within the church."

Rhonda had not joined the church yet, but after arriving home from Hawaii on September 8, "instead of agreeing with the travel agent's suggestion she and her mom fly home on September 11, 2001," she couldn't imagine what would have happened being in the air on 911! Feeling sure that God "may have helped us get home earlier, we decided to join the church after that experience."

Rhonda's involvement with West Hills over the years has been attending wonderful programs and outdoor concerts, etc., joining a book club, and being in a small group. West Hills "seemed like home to me." She has also volunteered as an usher, helped with the Easter Egg Hunt, yard work with Abide, and participated in the Midnight Run.

Rhonda graduated from the University of Nebraska Omaha and has been working for Lumen Technologies (originally USWest Communications) for the past 22 years. She is an avid cyclist, "loving it when I can ride my bike to church." She also is a very experienced writer and wrote the children's Christmas programs for West Hills over a number of years. Currently, she is preparing a couple of manuscripts for self-publication.

Rhonda shared, "I know I would not be on this path and in this life if there wasn't something that God wanted/or wants me to do. I only hope I can." When she was diagnosed with thyroid cancer, church members called and talked to her "quite often, which really helped me through the cancer and a very difficult time." Although Rhonda is single, she said she is not lonely or desperate. She feels there is a mate or spouse "out there for me, and although he's coming, he's walking S.L.O.W.L.Y. and probably from Ireland!" With such a talented lady, we feel he can't be too far away.

Peggy Wheeler and her late husband Jack built their house in Westgate shortly before West Hills Church was built. They had been attending Dundee Presbyterian Church at the time, but when Pastor Dooley and an Elder called on them asking if a church was built would they join, they both said "yes!" While West Hills was being built, the couple attended West Hills services across the street at the 84th & Center Drive-In Theatre.

Cars every Sunday would pull into one of the stalls, attach the theatre speaker in their window and sit back in their cars listening to Rev. Dooley give the sermon while standing on the projection booth. "We even dressed up for church every Sunday although we were sitting inside our cars!" However, cookies and coffee were served for those who got out of their cars and walked to the projection booth area. When Pastor Dooley found out Peg's husband was a banker, he immediately recruited him for the Building Committee. Once the church was built, Peggy sang in the choir, helped with the "many big meals we put on, and also made so many life-long friends. Because of her work experience in a bank (where she met her husband), she volunteered to become the church Treasurer.

Peg and her husband raised three children in Westgate, and even after moving out of the area, continued attending West Hills Church, which Peggy said: "is my strong foundation." After her husband's death, Peg said, it was "Pastor Candler who helped me through that very difficult time." Peggy had lost her mother when she was eight years old and said she had always attended church, even receiving the Pilgrim's Progress Award for perfect attendance for not missing a day of church for a whole year. Her Sunday School teacher became her "guide and best friend," taking the young Peggy under her wing and guiding her through a number of life's challenges and "keeping me out of trouble which wasn't an easy job!" Peg shared.

Peggy has been living at Westgate Assisted Living for the past several years, and, thanks to Bill Spiecker, continues to attend Thursday Morning Bible Study as well as church every Sunday. You may see her sitting next to her long-time friend, Pat King, in the front of the church, still singing in her beautiful voice the songs she has sung for years, as well as new ones. We are so glad Peggy is front and center every Sunday morning.

Donna Peterson and her husband Pete joined



West Hills Church in 1996. They had been married for 47 years when Pete died in 2005. Donna said she has always found the "West Hills Family to be very loving, caring and truly Jesus with skin on." Donna shared that

her Christian education began from the day she was born since her mother was a "strong Christian woman who was always singing Sunday School songs and reading Bible stories to me and my sister." Donna obviously followed in her mom's footsteps by becoming very active in church activities, and since her husband was a meteorologist in the Air Force, they moved around a lot, so her involvement was in base chapel activities, off base churches "or both."

After marrying, Donna continued working at Northwestern Bell until she had to quit since the policy then was women could not work beyond being five months pregnant! Their daughter Deborah was born, and after a number of moves, their son Greg was born. No matter where the family lived, Donna continued with her involvement in churches and chapels. After the family returned from Japan, Pete retired from the Air Force and eventually worked for the National Weather Service in West Palm Beach, Florida.

They returned to Omaha in 1990, where Donna continued being very involved in church activities, some of these being a Sunday School teacher, active in women's Bible associations, vacation Bible Schools, small groups, and cooking for various youth and other church groups. She had become a Deacon at Wheeler Memorial Presbyterian Church, where she and Pete had been married. At West Hills, Donna became part of a mission project, a Caregiving Ambassador, and one of the very needed phone receptionists at the church, as well as a Deacon of Caregiving.

Donna shared that she has "always leaned on 1 Thessalonians chapter 5 verses 15-18 for strength and encouragement." (look it up!) She feels blessed with two great children and their families, which includes five grandchildren, six great-grandchildren, and two step-grandsons. "God is GOOD, and I am so thankful to be one of His children and part of the West Hills Family," Donna said. We at West Hills are also blessed to have such a wonderful Christian role model in our family.

Walt Kunold is a Charter Member of West Hills



Church since he and his wife Cathy came to West Hills when the church he had attended since birth, Third Presbyterian Church (which was located at 20th & Leavenworth), decided to build a new church "way out

west on 82nd and Hascall" in the mid-1950s. Walt, a graduate of the American Banking Institute, worked in the banking field in various positions until his retirement in 2017.

He and his wife met while both worked as Med-Techs in Rapid City, South Dakota. Walt shared that after that first date with Cathy, "I never looked at another woman." Interestingly, the couple was married in 1954 by Rev. Dooley in a Presbyterian Church in Sturgis, South Dakota, where his wife was born. This was the same Reverend Dooley who would become the first minister at West Hills Church.

After West Hills was built, Walt became very active as an usher, member of the Session, and singing in the choir. The church, Walt shared, became a very important part of his life, as well as his wife's life, until she passed away in November of 2012. Walt was the primary caregiver to his wife, who had been diagnosed with Frontal Lobe Dementia.

After living in the family home for 55 years, where the couple raised their three children, Walt decided to sell the house after moving to an independent living apartment in Omaha. He said he has made many friends at West Hills and continues to keep in touch with several of them each week. Walt believes that success comes from

a good marriage, belonging to a strong church, and keeping in touch with family and friends often.

His daughter Sharon, who lives with her husband in Arizona, is in daily contact with her father and makes arrangements for her father to visit with them at their home on a yearly basis. Sharon was the first baby to be baptized at West Hills Church and follows her father's beliefs on the importance of family. It is always nice to learn about some of the history of our church, thanks to those who were instrumental in making West Hills a reality, like Walt Kunold.

Ginny Lakin was invited to visit West Hills by



her cousin, Donna Peterson, and eventually became a member on Easter Sunday of 2009. Ginny had been living in Bellevue, taking care of her 95-year-old aunt and brother, when they passed away, and she was feeling


"a bit lost" after moving into the West Hills neighborhood. She had been reading Ephesians 6:10-17 and asked God "how to put on His armor" when a new friend invited her to attend Bible Study Fellowship. This became a "new chapter in my life" through the in-depth study of His Word both through West Hill's Bible studies and through BSF. She was a BSF Leader for ten years for the Wednesday morning group.

Ginny graduated from college with a degree in Fine Arts and worked as the Assistant Advertising Director at the Brandeis Department store in Omaha, where she stayed for 11 years. Her next career position came at an Art Studio where artwork was done "for anyone needing our help." After another 11 years, one of their satisfied customers asked Ginny to start an art department in his manufacturing company. To Ginny, this was a "dream job creating everything from tee-shirts to trade show materials to package design." She stayed at the job for 18 years. During this time, Ginny said, "God had trusted me with the task of caring for my older brother Dave who was diagnosed with Alzheimer's disease."

She also shared that God had given her a number of caregiving assignments over the years, such as "caring for a motherless nephew, becoming a family friend to three young motherless neighbors (who are still friends 40 years later), and becoming a West Hills Caregiver for several years."

She also used her art gifts at West Hills in decorating for the Special Saturday events the church used to have, helping with the Celebrations Senior luncheons, stating that "the table decorations were my favorite contributions!" Although Ginny said that she had never married and has no children, from her life story, it appears as though she has had a number of "children" that she provided guidance and help throughout their lives. Ginny now volunteers one afternoon a week at the church as the phone/receptionist. Ginny's life Bible verse has been Philippians 4:8 (look it up) which appears very appropriate for Ginny.

SPIRITUAL FORMATION - WHERE WE'VE BEEN AND WHERE

WE'RE GOING by Rick Mason, Elder

Hello Friends, new and old. I am excited to give an update on recent goings-on in the **Spiritual Formation and Discipleship** (SF&D) ministry. We have enjoyed some new and interesting studies and have found a discipleship event that many enjoyed.

Beginning the year, Jeff Smith led an intriguing study on Jonah. The study was "The Prodigal Prophet" by Timothy Keller. With Mr. Keller, you knew the study would be deep, but learned that Jonah brings so much more than being a mis-directional prophet swallowed by a big fish. Jonah's story paralleled that of the Prodigal Son - who knew? And beyond that, we have come to learn that Jesus identified specifically with Jonah, something I would never have considered on my own. I can honestly say that I now identify more with Jonah than most of the other characters of the Bible. We averaged 7-10 people per week, and the discussions could have kept going.

Currently, Karen Jarvis is leading an Adam Hamilton Lenten study, "24 Hours that Changed the World." This study provides a foundation of Jesus' final days with detailed explanations of these events that you may have never considered. This study helps us to reflect on the anguish and suffering that Jesus took upon himself to remove the stain of sin from each of us. We have been averaging 7 participants thus far.

The strong and mighty women's Wednesday morning and evening studies averaged 10-15 participants for each study. Tracy Enholm and Jane Loeck continue to challenge their group on Wednesday mornings at 9:15 - now on Zoom. They began the year with a study by Sheila Walsh, "Holding on When you Feel like Letting Go." I probably should have attended that one myself, but apparently, I did not qualify - sorry, women only. This study ends the last week in March, with no new study determined yet.

The Wednesday evening women's study continues to be popular. Leann Schaffer continues to lead that study at 6:00 pm in the Chapel. They started the year with a study by Lysa TerKeurst, "Best Yes: Making Wise Decisions in the Midst of Endless Demands." Another study I clearly could have used. That study ended in mid-February; then they moved on to the current study by Sheila Walsh (she must be very popular) "The Storm Inside." That study will continue into late April.

Congratulations to the **Thursday morning study** led by **Gloria Zinn** – that study is now co-ed. I wonder if they had a gender reveal party to kick that off? This study uses the **Serendipity Bible**, currently studying the Book of Exodus. If you are not familiar with the Serendipity Bible, you should make an attempt to attend this class. It is a very good study with questions developed by pastors that help guide you through the Bible. Anyone can participate, the seasoned studier on down to the first time Bible reader – we fully intend to do another Serendipity study on Sunday mornings in the future.

From mid-February to mid-March, Kevin Gibson led a study on Thursday nights via Zoom discussing "Essential Worship" by Greg Scheer. Eighteen participants were enrolled in this group, and they averaged 13 participants per week. The age range of the participants was 16 - 86. Talk about intergenerational impact! This study discussed the definition of worship, biblical worship, the arts and senses in worship, and the role of music in worship. Thanks to Kevin for pulling this off despite his busy schedule.

We talked a lot about women's studies, but good news for the men of West Hills. For those of you wanting to engage in a Bible study, but find Tuesday morning study way too early, men's ministry has determined that we can support two additional Bible studies. One on Wednesday evenings at 7:00 pm - hybrid (in person and on Zoom) and a Friday noon study - hybrid (but likely leaning more toward zoom). These studies are in the plans, with the first class expected to be Wednesday, April 27th, and Friday, April 29th. More to come on these studies. Also, men, keep your eyes peeled for more information regarding "Game Day," which will be held Saturday, April 23rd, from 9:00 to noon, with lunch following.

Finally, the event that everyone is talking about. The last two Sundays of February, we held a relationship-building event called "Getting to Know You." This was a fun, casual, and carefree event with the primary purpose of meeting new people and learning more

about them. We learned that someone has jumped out of an airplane, someone came face to face with an elephant, two separate individuals were impacted by a bank robbery. I bet you're wondering who now, aren't you? This was another intergenerational event from young people to those exuding refined wisdom. We even saw two new couples to the church join the event. This was so popular we are planning additional events in the near future, perhaps in a larger venue like the fellowship hall. Don't miss out - keep watching the Window and Thursday Thoughts for more to come.

So, hopefully, you can see that SF&D has been busy looking for ways to engage the community of West Hills in biblical study, opportunities to grow spiritually, and building relationships.

SMALL GROUPS 101: SAYING NOTHING MEANS EVERYTHING by Sheryl Overby, Deacon of Caregiving Outreach

Some of you may know that my profession for the past 3O+ years has been a mental health counselor. Some folks call me their therapist, shrink, or "doc ." The "skills of my trade" come in handy occasionally when talking with my hairdresser or guessing which character is the criminal in a TV show, but I try hard to separate my work life from my personal life. My husband and I have been a member of several small groups during our time at West Hills Church. We have enjoyed these opportunities to develop relationships at various phases of our lives.

One time several years ago, someone shared about an argument they had with their sister. Without me realizing it, I leaned forward, put my elbows on my knees, and with perfect eye contact and a very soothing Freudian voice said, "How did that make you feel?" We all burst into laughter as I apologized profusely for turning into a therapist, and I joked that I might have to collect payment in the form of another piece of chocolate cake. Being in a **small group** is certainly not supposed to be therapy. It is an opportunity to "be with" one another as we go through life and our spiritual journey. Other counseling skills have been helpful, though, especially remaining silent and actively listening. So, when someone is sharing something deeply personal, please don't ask questions, change the subject or tell a story of your cousin's best friend who had the same thing happen to them. Instead, sit quietly, be with that person, silently say a prayer, and send your love to them with your body language. Your presence with them at that moment is what matters and saying nothing can mean everything.

COMING SOON FOR MEN!

Communion Bread by Gloria Zinn



When I grew up at Central Presbyterian Church in Omaha, the ladies of the church took turns making the Communion bread from a recipe the church had used for many, many

years. My sister and I were thrilled when it was my mom's turn to make the Communion bread because we would eat as much as she would let us before cutting it into small squares. She always felt we might be committing a sin by eating the bread, so she asked the minister if that was ok. He assured her it wasn't a sin!

Years later, when I became an elder and had the responsibility of passing the bread and wine, my three kids would come into the room off the sanctuary where we elders were washing the small glasses which held the "wine" and cleaning the trays of bread. Like their mother and aunt before them, they would eat as much Communion bread as possible! Like my mom, I too asked the minister if that was permissible, and he assured me as long as they weren't taking handfuls as we passed the communion bread in the sanctuary, there was no problem.

Before I left this church, I got the recipe, which had always been given to whoever was responsible for making the bread, since my grown-up kids had been asking for it. It became one of the desserts we used, with strawberries and whip cream at family dinners.

Central Presbyterian Communion Bread

- 1 cup of butter creamed with 1 cup of sugar
- Mix together ½ tsp. salt,
- 1/3 tsp. of baking powder, and 4½ cups of flour
- Add dry ingredients alternately with 1 cup of milk to butter and sugar mixture
- Add 3 egg whites beaten stiff
- The dough will be thicker than cookie dough
- Place dough on greased and floured 11x17 cookie sheet and spread with a spatula dampened with milk.
- Bake 15-20 minutes in a 350-degree oven

Greg Schuchman and Les Peterson will assist the Wednesday night group in getting started, and Jason Scheopner and Greg will help the Friday noon group get started.




Parent Cue is an app created for parents with kids of all ages (preschool, kindergarten and first grade, second and third grade, preteen, middle school and high school).

Spiritual Growth and Church's Activities

- Churches morning/evening services continued regularly. However, church subsidiary meetings were suspended many times due to the increase of coronavirus cases.
- The church participated in a prayer gathering that was organized by the Evangelical Church in Luxor. The day was followed by a fellowship time at one of the parks in the city.
- The church has organized a spiritual gathering for teens in Luxor. The day included a sermon, games time, and giving presents to the winners.
- The youth in the church has participated in a 3-day outreach training that was organized by the Upper Egypt presbytery.
- A spiritual gathering was organized in Kom Ombo village, and Rev. Shenouda shares that they were touched by the presence of the Lord that day.
- The church organized many spiritual gatherings and festivals for Sunday school meeting kids.
- In cooperation with the churches in Luxor and Souhag, the church organized a 2-day outreach convoy in September. A lot of home visits were done, and meetings were held in the evenings.
- Together with the ministry team, Rev. Shenouda makes home visits to the members of his congregation to encourage them and pray with the sick. Moreover, they try to provide for the need of families.
- Together with Rev. Gerges, four leaders from the church are still attending the leadership school, organized by the Evangelical church in Luxor.
- The church organizes monthly training for church leaders. Once, they invited Elder Adel Noshy as a trainer.

Social services & activities

- The church has organized three awareness gatherings in a nearby village (one for women, one for teens, and one for kids). Through lectures, drama, and songs, the gatherings encouraged people to accept each other and stop bullying.
- A visit to Al Orman hospital for Cancer in Luxor was one of the notable events in 2021. Rev. Shenouda and the ministry team wanted to support and encourage the doctors and the patients. They put a Christmas tree at the hospital. Patients and doctors decorated the tree in a joyful atmosphere.

About the building

- By the grace of God, the church finished the worship hall in the ground floor and building façade.

Encouraging news


- The Lord healed a girl called Dina who suffered from her kidney for a long time.
