SONG NOTES

Jesu, Jesu, Fill Us with Your Love

Tom Colvin wrote the words and the tune is from a Ghana folk song. For 15 years, Colvin was a missionary in Africa, where he was very much involved in encouraging the singing of indigenous music. He translated a collection of African hymns into English and published them both in Great Britain and the United States. "Jesu, Jesu," speaks of neighbors in a global sense, as well as the person next door. Christ responded to all persons' needs as a servant, with the humility of a slave.

Lord. I Want to Be a Christian

Miles Mark Fisher, in Negro Slave Songs in the United States, writes that this African American spiritual could have been written in Virginia in the 175Os based on a story from Hanover, Virginia, 1756: "A black slave asked Presbyterian preacher William Davies, 'I come to you, sir, that you may tell me some good things concerning Jesus Christ and my duty to God, for I am resolved not to live any more as I have done... Sir, I want to be a Christian."

"Lord, I want to be a Christian" is among a group of African American spirituals that appears both in mainline denominational hymnals and in African American hymnals in the United States. It was first published in Folk Songs of the American Negro in 1907.

Lift Every Voice and Sing

Few hymns have the capacity to define the identity of an entire group. "Lift Every Voice" began as a hastily-written composition for an unassuming school assembly in 1900, but has become the African American national anthem.

James Weldon Johnson wrote the text and his brother, J. Rosamund, wrote the music for this song. James had been asked to speak by the principal of a school in Jacksonville, Fla., his hometown, for an observance celebrating the birth of Abraham Lincoln. Rather than make a speech, he decided to write a poem. As the time drew near, his plans changed from writing a poem to a song.

Even though the Johnsons' New York publisher did not actively promote the song, children throughout the South kept it alive. The song gathered momentum, as it became known around the country.
