This fall we took a river cruise on the Danube. For the Germans, Austrians and Hungarians who rely upon the river it was a very difficult season as record low water levels meant many barges were grounded. This meant small towns which rely upon the river for goods and tourists were hurting as gas/diesel and essential goods were in short supply and many tourists stayed away when they were told that large areas of the river were off limits and several locks would be closed.

But for us, the low water gave us a remarkable blessing.

Before we left for Europe, we were given a 25% discount off another cruise to compensate us for taking several coach rides and switching between three different ships.

Since it had been awhile since we had been in Asia, we opted to make a reservation, using the discount, on one of the twice-yearly trips between Bali and Bangkok in 2020. We secured the last cabin in our price range for an April 4 sailing.

Since we wanted to spend a few weeks after the cruise to be of service to those in need we contacted our friends in Canada to ask about opportunities in northern Thailand where they had worked for several seasons. They forwarded our request to their daughter and son-in-law who live in no Thailand who replied that one of their partner organizations has a definite need for people to teach English to AIDS victims and as an aside they gave us the opportunity to stay in their home while they are on leave in Canada.

Yes, God continues to work miracles! How else can you explain how low water levels on the Danube gave us the opportunity to be of service in Thailand?

As we are humbled and grateful for this opportunity our hope is that you will remember the psalmist when he encourages us to "Delight yourself in the Lord and he will give you the desires of your heart" Psalms 37:4



Lenten small groups will also start that week studying this book and discussing the sermon. We invite everyone to join a small group! All Church - GAME NIGHT - January 4, 2019





Ingredients

- 1 box brownie mix (not family size), prepared according to package directions in 9"x9" pan
- ½ cup chopped salted or honey roasted peanuts
- 12 peanut butter cups, chopped
- 2 cups semi-sweet chocolate chips
- 1 Tbsp butter
- 1 heaping cup creamy peanut butter (or 1 ¼ cups)
- 1 ¾ cups crispy rice cereal
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- ½-1 tsp kosher salt

Instructions

Bake brownies according to package directions in a 9"x9" pan lined with foil.

During last 5 minutes of baking, remove from oven and sprinkle chopped peanut butter cups and chopped peanuts on top.

Return to oven for remaining 5 minutes to melt the chocolate.

As soon as you pull them out of the oven, spread the melty peanut butter cups/peanuts with an offset spatula to smooth over top.

Let brownies cool.

Next, in a microwave safe bowl combine chocolate chips, peanut butter and butter. Heat in microwave for 1 minute, stirring when done. If needed, repeat heating in 20 second increments until chocolate chips are melted.

Stir in cereal, vanilla and salt until evenly combined.

Pour over brownies and smooth. Chill until chocolate is set, about 2 hours.


Cut into 25 squares to serve.



BIBLE TRIVIA



The continents were created as one large land mass. Genesis 1:9 "And God said, "Let the water under the sky be gathered to one place, and let dry ground appear." And it was so. Many geologists agree there is strong evidence that the earth was originally one super continent just as the Bible said way back in Genesis.

The first and most obvious was that the "continents fit together like a tongue and groove." Another telltale hint that Earth's continents were all one land mass comes from the geologic record. Coal deposits found in Pennsylvania have a similar composition to those spanning across Poland, Great Britain and Germany from the same time period. That indicates that North America and Europe must have once been a single landmass. And mountain chains that now lie on different continents, such as the Appalachians in the United States and the Atlas Mountains in Morocco were, at one time, together in one place.

Intergenerational Ministry- What's That? by Jessica Scheopner

O, my people, hear my teaching... I will utter hidden things, things from of old – what we have heard and know, what our fathers have told us. We will not hide them from their children; we will tell the next generation the praiseworthy deeds of the LORDso the next generation would know them... and they in turn would tell their children. Psalm 78:1-6

For about a decade now, I have been reading about intergenerational ministry (IM). In October, Jack Pagel and I attended an event called “Intentional Intergenerational Ministry.” I have seen how intergenerational ministry works anecdotally, but I was excited to learn more about how experts have seen it work more broadly and with research. IM is called by many different names, but the idea is rooted in Psalm 78: God wants us to pass on the stories of who he is. One way that happens is from generation to generation. Intergenerational Ministry develops disciples and energizes churches by:

- Bringing together any combination of at least two generations in planned and purposeful settings
- Empowering multiple generations to mutually invest in each other and in their faith community
- Intentionally encouraging Christian relationships among multiple generations.

In future months, I will share more about what IM is, what it isn't, and how we can enjoy its benefits at West Hills. For February, I leave you with three challenges:

1. Be watching for ways that you interact with people in other generations, both older and younger, to intentionally invest in, learn from, and encourage one another. I think you will see that there are already many of these opportunities and precious relationships in place at West Hills – it's part of what binds us together so well!
2. We have planned monthly fun for ALL West Hills. Check out the pictures from the first intergenerational event of 2019 – the West Hills Game Night – where people from toddlerhood to retirees had a great time connecting and learning from one another!
3. The monthly events are an easy invitation for YOU to share. Father-daughter events are hard to find; INVITE AND BLESS a family member, friend, co-worker, and neighbor via postcard, email, or Facebook. Help us fill the Fellowship Hall!




A Nudge From Above by Wendi Meyer

The Holy Spirit will often direct our path if we are opened to listening. A “nudge from above” may reveal God's plan to us in a spontaneous manner, or perhaps in a still small voice that speaks to us over and over again.

For West Hills church member Gloria Zinn, that voice repeatedly spoke to her every time she drove past Westgate Assisted Living. “They need a Bible study,” it seemed to repeat. Since her daughter Beth Nodes was, at the time, the social worker for West Hills Church, and very familiar with Westgate Assisted Living, she gathered the information she needed and met with Brad Bushow, director of the facility. They did not have a Bible study and were “very interested in having someone start one,” according to Brad. Gloria contacted Debbie Chadwick about sharing the weekly teaching, and she agreed. The two then met with Brad to discuss the particulars of starting a Bible study group and although he was enthusiastic and supportive, cautioned the two that there may be a “limited number of participants since our residents usually aren't joiners in any activities!”

Brad was right. That first year, 2014, only four or five residents came to the Monday morning Bible study on a regular basis. However, it continued and by 2018, enrollment increased significantly! There are usually 20-25 participants every Monday and two more teachers have agreed to teach, Maralee Gifford and myself. Besides the residents at Westgate Assisted Living who are attending, there are also residents from Crown Point, their next door neighbor, and even members from West Hills Church! The variety of participants in this co-ed group allows for some wonderful discussions. Each of the four teachers is assigned a particular Monday to teach. They are responsible in preparing the lesson as well as any handouts and facilitating related discussion questions as well as “anything else to make sure the Bible lesson taught is of importance and relevant to the participants.” From the beginning various pastors' DVD series have been used to increase a participant's knowledge of God's Word in today's society. The teachers have often remarked how their own knowledge of the Bible has been increased as well. This vibrant group studies a variety of material, such as Liz Curtis Higgs' *Bad Girls of the Bible* (which produced lots of laughter) and, *A Life Beyond Amazing*, from Dr. David Jeremiah.

Anyone is welcomed to join the group at Westgate Assisted Living, 3030 South 80 Street, right up the hill, east of the church. This is a non-denominational group so feel free to bring a friend or two. They are located on the second floor, and begin every Monday, at 10:00 a.m. The community of others studying God's Word on a Monday morning makes the week so much brighter.



FIVE SMOOTH STONES

When David decided to face the giant, Goliath, he did so by first picking up five smooth stones he found in a nearby stream. He placed them in the pouch of his shepherd's bag and "approached Goliath with his sling in his hand." 1st Samuel 17:40.

Why five stones? It only took one of those stones, coupled with David's strong faith in God, to kill the giant. Was David expecting to use more than one of the smooth stones? Was he doubting God by not placing just one stone in his shepherd's bag? Did he believe he would need more stones in order to attack the entire Philistine army?

According to some biblical scholars David was simply being prepared to face the largest member in the Philistine army. Goliath was over nine feet tall and was fully armored on the day he and David met on the battlefield. Apparently David only needed one of the smooth stones from his shepherd's bag since the Philistine army fled after he killed Goliath and cut off his head. David, however, was spiritually prepared to face the giant. His faith and total trust in God was unwavering and he "walked" Romans 8:31, "if God be for us who can be against us?"

David had experienced God's delivery from other challenges in his life, defeating the attacks of a bear as well as a lion while shepherding his flock, so he had no doubt about God's power to help him now. David was very aware that his ability to kill the giant was not in his sling or even the use of all five smooth stones in his shepherd's bag. He knew it was his trust, faith and belief in God that would sustain him and nothing that he personally did.

Before David appeared on the battlefield Goliath had been taunting the Israelites twice a day for forty days, but not one of the Israelites, not even King Saul, felt the strength and power of God to defeat this enemy.

How about us? What five smooth stones do we place in our "shepherd's bag" to face the Goliath's in our life? We may be experiencing a dreaded diagnosis from our physician or experiencing continuous medical problems, the loss of a loved one, an unhappy or broken marriage, a wayward or unbelieving child, or the pressure from family members to move from a home where we've lived for over 40 years to an assisted living facility. From David's story we can learn that our God is capable of defeating any of the giants we face in our life: fear, depression, financial issues, doubts in our faith, etc., if we know Him well enough to completely place our trust in Him.

But, how do we learn to know God that well? Perhaps one of our five smooth stones could be filled with God's word by reading and learning about His nature and love through the Bible on a daily basis. Joining a small group on Wednesday nights to grow in our knowledge, and/or joining a Bible study group or partnering with another dedicated journey mate who is dedicated to growing in their faith. Our second smooth stone from our shepherd's bag could be faithfully praying to God every day, thanking him for the smallest to the largest things in our universe. Asking God to "search me, God, and know my heart; test me and know my anxious thoughts. See if there is any offensive way in me, and lead me in the way everlasting." (Psalm 139:23-24.) We could read and memorize Bible verses that tell us more about God and His character. Learn to know Him better than we know the person closest to us. Requesting God's guidance and His will in our life and accepting that will, especially

when it doesn't align with our own. Our third smooth stone could be our full belief and acceptance that God loves us, unconditionally, and as we have learned in James 1:3, accept through tests that a Christian will learn to withstand the pressures of a trial until God removes it at His appointed time. We can learn to even cherish the benefit of those tests if we accept God's will and not our own.

The testing of our faith, John MacArthur points out, drives believers to deeper communion and greater trust in God, qualities that will produce a stable, godly and righteous character, such as we have read in 1st and 2nd Samuel about David. Our fourth stone could be honoring God, putting Him, as David did, in the center of our life as we fight our own will in dealing with our Goliaths. David informed the giant, as he moved toward him, that he was meeting him on the battlefield in the name of the Lord. Sometimes we may forget that no matter what the outcome, as Christians we will do what is right because we follow a God who provides what we need to face our giants, so we are never alone. Finally our last smooth stone in our shepherd's bag could be showing love and compassion to others, just as our God has shown love and compassion to us. No matter what others may say or do to us we stay strong in our belief that "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me" Philippians 4:13. As our love, trust and faith will grow through our commitment in learning more about God, we should continually thank Him for His faithfulness and love for us.

So no matter what our Goliath may be in our lives we have the freedom to fill our shepherd's bag with the tools those five smooth stones offer. We have the option to open our shepherd's bag and use those tools when life becomes overwhelming, when the giants come knocking at our door. However, God has given us the freedom to follow David's lead or remain passive in our faith journey. The choice is ours.

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
