On April 25th, West Hills Church lost a creative Director of Music and Worship, a faithful servant, a gifted musician, and a dear friend. Since then, I have heard countless stories of Kevin Gibson's interaction with members of our

West Hills family, whether it be his bantering about his beloved Missouri Tigers, his inquisitive questions regarding our "Presbyterianisms", tales of his most recent Pickleball game, or his constant texting...the list goes on and on.

Kevin, and his sidekick, Heather, were among the first to bring humor and smiles back into our lives as we found ourselves isolated during the pandemic. Whether they were hosting a crazy game show, calling Bingo numbers, dangling their feet in a kiddie pool in the parking lot, or holding trivia contests...their humor and antics were a welcomed distraction from our stress-filled days.

When the rooms and hallways of West Hills fell dark due to the pandemic, Kevin introduced Pickleball to West Hills! Folks who previously had never considered spending time in the gym found themselves enjoying exercise, laughter and fellowship while attempting to maneuver the strange paddle and wiffleball in the court which Kevin had painstakingly marked with green tape.

I was blessed to serve on Kevin's Worship Arts Team which introduced West Hills to the Holy Week Devotion, the Journey to the Cross Stations during Lent, the Service of Darkness on Maundy Thursday/Good Friday, and the Hanging of the Green Service during Advent. He taught me so much about the importance of exploring all our senses during our worship experience, whether it be with the impeccable musical selections, the explosion of color on the Sanctuary wall, or the works of art by both local and renowned artists.

And then, there were the Christmas decorations!!! Kevin Gibson was the only person that I knew who could possibly think that West Hills did not have enough Christmas decorations! When you see

the four trees under the cross, the flickering pillar candles, the garland draped sanctuary, and the glowing lanterns...remember to thank the Lord that He brought Kevin to West Hills to show us how to experience worship.

As **Elder of Nominating**, I have been thinking about Kevin Gibson's legacy. He touched our hearts and has undoubtedly left a legacy at West Hills. We are each called by God to do the same. It may be very different from Kevin's legacy, but it is essential to God's world, none the less.

In Max Lucado's book, The Touch of the Master's Hand, he asks, "Wouldn't you love to look back on your life and know you had done what you were called to do?"

Wouldn't we all want to answer this question with a resounding, "Yes!" And how does this speak to each of us? How are we using the gifts that the Lord has given us for His glory? Are we doing what we are called to do?

In his book, Bedside Blessings, Charles Swindoll states, "In an overpopulated world, it's easy to underestimate the significance of one. A NEW LIFE IN 90 DAYS! by Jeff Smith



No, this is not a diet fad or a TV commercial but a fact of life for refugees who resettle to Omaha.

Just imagine what it would be like if you and your family, with three children, lived in a one room cottage without running water in a refugee camp in Thailand for 20 years, and the next day you were flown to the United States. Upon arrival in Omaha, you were placed in a three bedroom home and assigned a case manager who had just 90 days to help you with a new language, housing, navigating a complicated bureaucracy for health care/food assistance and finding work.

Although a 90-day window may seem like "Mission Impossible," we at West Hills have had the great privilege of helping a family of five (father, mother, and three boys) adapt to their new home. The family has found a church home. They have started language training. Soon their father will begin work, two of the younger children are enrolled in a summer school program to help with language and their oldest son will soon enroll in a Job Corps program to learn a skill. This amazing adjustment was made possible thanks to the help and support of our church family (furniture, supplies, clothes, and donations), their friends/relatives, and staff from Lutheran Family Services (LFS). Although the family has made remarkable progress adjusting to life in the U.S., they still face some daunting financial challenges. Lars, the father of the family, applied for a social security card some time ago, but he is still waiting on it to arrive. While he waits, the family has no source of income other than minimal government assistance. And just this week, because their government allowance was delayed, the family had just a few

dollars to their name. Thank goodness we were able to provide some financial support thanks to donations previously received from West Hills. Since they will need some ongoing financial assistance until they can get established, some additional support /donations would be very much appreciated.

We know supporting a refugee family was a new initiative for us, and some may have had questions about doing this, but thanks to the work, effort, donations, and prayers we have the joy of giving "a new life" to this family and a significant jump start for their life in America.

Note: Although we had originally been paired with a family from Afghanistan, when that family left Omaha to be closer to their family—staff from Lutheran Family Services asked if we would be willing to give support to a Karin family from Thailand.



THE HISTORY BEHIND A FEW FAMILIAR OLD HYMNS by Gloria Zinn



"Amazing Grace how sweet the sound, that saved a wretch like me". Familiar words to many of us from the pen of John Newton, a slave ship captain and a man who had mocked religion for years. Newton described himself as a "wretch" and a "totally immoral man in word and deed." During a violent thunderstorm at sea in 1748 Newton's slave ship was almost destroyed, along with his crew. He had been relieved by another crew member, who was swept overboard. Newton began to pray that God would forgive him of his wicked lifestyle, and the ship and remainder of

the crew were saved. However, this "spiritual awakening" did not stop his continued work as a slave trader. When he had to retire, due to medical problems in 1754, Newton began to study theology. Ten years later he became a pastor in England and used the words he had written, "I once was lost, but now am found/was blind but now I see" in a sermon on New Year's Day in 1773. John Newton had also become an abolitionist, writing a graphic account of his experiences with slavery, and repenting of his involvement in the field of slavery. A copy of his well-read pamphlet was sent to each member of Parliament, and Newton would testify against slavery at every parliamentary hearing. He died in 1807, nine months after Parliament abolished the slave trade in the British Empire. Over the years "Amazing Grace" has become the most familiar and treasured hymn throughout the world as a testimony of God's divine grace given to anyone who seeks Him.

"When peace like a river attendeth my way, when sorrows like sea billows roll; Whatever my lot, Thou hast taught me to say, 'It is well, it is well with my soul.'" Horatio Gates Spafford, a successful lawyer in Chicago, lost his 4 year old son to pneumonia in 1871, as well as most of his finances due to the Chicago fire of that year that destroyed almost the entire city. He made plans two years later to travel to England with his wife Anna and their four daughters to help D.L. Moody with his evangelistic campaign. When business required him to stay in Chicago he sent his family ahead, planning to follow them in a few days. After four days at sea the ship his family was on collided with a sea vessel and sank. His four daughters died, but his wife survived and sent Spafford a telegram: "Saved alone. What should I do." He quickly set sail on the first ship going to Europe so he could be with his grieving wife. When the ship's captain informed Mr. Spafford they were passing over the place where the other ship had sunk, and his daughters had drowned, he stared down at that dark water and later went to his cabin, being inspired to write the poem that would become a very well-loved hymn, "It Is Well With My Soul."



THE HISTORY BEHIND A FEW FAMILIAR OLD HYMNS, continued



"O Lord, my God, when I, in awesome wonder" are the beginning words to the very familiar hymn, "**How Great Thou Art.**" The poem was written by a Swedish author and editor, Carl Boberg in 1885. He and some friends were caught in a heavy thunderstorm where strong winds and flashing lightning caused the group to seek shelter. When the storm ended, the sky cleared with a "beautiful rainbow", and inspired by the sounds of the birds singing and the change in the environment, Boberg was moved to write a poem entitled "How Great Thou Art." Boberg said several years

later he was amazed to hear his poem being sung by a congregation in church to an old Swedish folk melody! It went through various translations as many other countries were impressed with the words and the music. In 1957, the Billy Graham crusade in New York City made it a standard hymn, and many denominations today use this familiar hymn as one of their favorites.



"**What a friend we have in Jesus, All our sins and griefs to bear!**" This very familiar hymn was first written as a poem by Pastor Joseph Scriven, a native of Dublin, Ireland. He graduated from Trinity College, becoming a minister and was anticipating his marriage to his childhood sweetheart. However, the day before the wedding his fiancée was riding her horse to meet Joseph when her horse was startled by something and she was thrown into a nearby river, where she was knocked unconscious and

drowned. Joseph could no longer stand to continue living in Ireland, and moved to Canada. There his life was dedicated to good works, caring for others, and tutoring children. He fell in love and in 1854 planned to marry, however again tragedy struck and his young 23 year old fiancée died of pneumonia. He stated his commitment to God helped him throughout his life struggles, and he wrote finding solace in "the nearness of God who is my closest friend." In 1855 he sent his poem to his mother in a letter "intending that it be seen only by her," although he had originally published the poem anonymously. By 1865, a well-known publishing firm published it and three years later music was composed by Charles Converse. It had been criticized as being "too much on the order of the sentimental gospel type" but its popularity grew and it has become a favorite hymn for many churches over the years.

FATHER'S DAY POEM - "SO GOD MADE A FATHER" by May Patterson

As we celebrate fathers this month, this is a special poem by May Patterson on the role fathers may hope to live out here on earth. *Note: This poem was inspired by Paul Harvey's "So God Made a Farmer."*

At the dawn of time, God looked down on all He had made and said, "Now, I need a caretaker."

So, God made a father.

God said, "I need someone to teach children to fish, and to ride a bike without training wheels, and to play catch in the backyard. It must be someone who's tough enough to run a chainsaw and wield a machete and yet, gentle enough to join his little girl and her dolls for tea."

So, God made a father.

"I need someone to bring the car around when it's raining, so everyone else can stay dry. Someone who will keep jumper cables in his truck, just in case he needs to help a stranger. I need someone to notice practical things, like how the tread on the tires is wearing and if the weather stripping around the front door needs replacing, for no one else will."

"I'll create someone who's strong enough to open a tightly sealed jelly jar and tall enough to place the angel on top of the Christmas tree. Someone who will be gracious enough to let his son fish the best fishing hole or to let his daughter win at least one hand of gin rummy."

"Yes, he will struggle to find his glasses and keys," God thought. "But I'll help him find time for the important things, like tumbling with the kids in the den floor, or saying 'I'm proud of you, son,' or giving Mama a hug."

So, God made a father.

God said, "I need someone brave enough to carve the Thanksgiving turkey, for no one else seems to want the job. Someone who's not afraid to go into Grandma's dark cellar, or to check on what goes bump in the night, or to remove the dead mouse from the mousetrap."

"I need someone wise enough to know when to let his child fail. Someone who will pick her up, dry her tears and say, 'Honey, I know you can do it! Give it another try.'"

"I need someone who listens more than he talks. Who will stand by his family through laughter and tears, tornadoes and snowstorms, good times and bad. Someone who will love his kids and love their mother even more."

So, God made a father.



God said, "I need someone to provide for the family. Someone who will get up early and stay up late and never complain. I need someone who's willing to make unpopular decisions and stand by them. Someone to provide authority and discipline, as well as love."

"I need someone with broad shoulders, broad enough to carry a little child around town and broad enough to pull more than his fair share. Yes, I need someone who will work the second-shift, or take second-best, or play second fiddle, so that his family can have it better than he did."

"I need someone who is willing . . . willing to man up and provide the love, support and strength his family will so desperately need."

So, God made a father.

"Sometimes, he will not feel worthy of the love his family gives him. There will be times when he fails to live up to my ideal standard. But when his family needs him, he will show up, or give up, or do whatever needs to be done."

"Yes, that's exactly what I need," thought God as He shook His head. "A father to love my children, and if necessary, to lay down his life for them. Someone . . . well, someone like **Me**."

So, God made a father.

**He is the first hero a little child will ever know.
His influence lasts much longer than his life.
He is an *earthly* portrayal of the *Heavenly Father*.**

On Father's Day, our nation will pause to celebrate our fathers. But it might be difficult for you to celebrate because your father is no longer around. Or maybe your relationship with your father is broken, or not what you hoped it would be.

Even if you can't celebrate with your earthly father on Father's Day, you can still celebrate with your Heavenly Father.

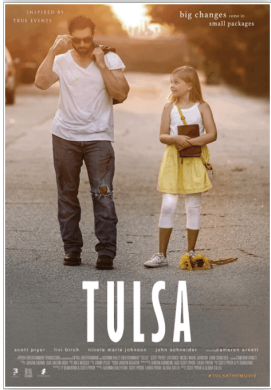

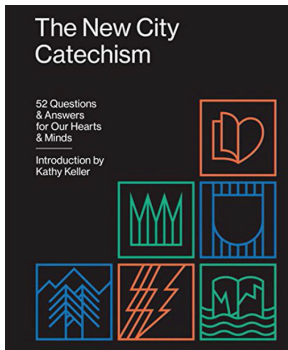
MOVIE SUGGESTION

BOOK SUGGESTION



The book, “The New City Catechism: 52 Questions and Answers for our Hearts and Minds” was published by The Gospel Coalition and Redeemer Presbyterian Church in New York City.

According to Timothy Keller, founder of Redeemer Presbyterian Church, “At present, the practice of catechism, particularly among adults, has been almost completely lost. If we reengage this biblical practice in our churches, we will find again God’s Word dwelling in us richly (Col. 3:16). Because the practice of catechism takes truth deep into our hearts, so we find ourselves thinking in biblical categories as soon as we can reason”.

In addition, each question’s answer gives visual learners a special picture to interpret and understand, along with icons of significant biblical themes. Also, highlighted sections within the answers give younger readers an age-appropriate version of the answer.

According to book reviewer Joseph Rossell, “The entire catechism can be memorized in one year by memorizing one question and answer per week, along with the accompanying picture.”

Explore, laugh, eat, paddle, rest, and prepare your heart for the new school year with some time in the beautiful Niobrara River valley.

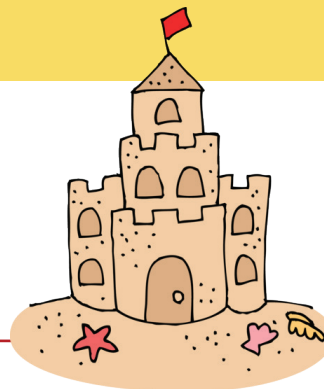
