The conception of the cross of the Roman Empire was a symbol of a murder weapon to kill criminals, social outcasts and outlaws. The crucifixion was lifted up in a high place so that everyone might see it to bring fear into the hearts of all who saw it.

Also the crucifixion for Jews was a curse and divine wroth as the Holy Bible says in Galatians 3:13 *"Cursed is everyone who is hung up on a pole."* So the word *cross* meant criminality, breaking the law and cursing.

So the question is, Why did Jesus die on the cross? The testimony of the Roman Empire was *"I find no basis for a charge against him."* (John 18:38) Also, the centurion said *"Truly this was the son of God."* (Matthew 27:54.)

So my dear reader, if Jesus wasn't a mistake, why did Jesus die on the cross?

The answer is:

The story of the cross of Jesus was God's plan for redemption of mankind from condemnation. Through the cross, Jesus Himself reconciled all the nations into one body with God.

Ephesians 2:16 "... and one body to reconcile both of them to God through the cross by which he put to death their hostility." Also, through the cross of Jesus the divine love and divine worth met together so Jesus on the cross did pay for our sins.

Col 1:14 "In whom we have redemption through his blood, even the forgiveness of sin." Also, through the cross of Jesus God showed his great love to all the world.

John 3:16 "For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only son that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life."

Despite the great love story on the cross the world refused it and they considered the cross a dramatic play and persecuted all the believers in him.

In the year 303, during the period of the Roman Empire, Diocletian burned thousands of holy Bibles, churches, and crosses and thousands of Christians were killed for the cross.

When Islam occupied the Middle East (previously Christian countries) thousands of holy Bibles, churches and crosses were burned and thousands of Christians were killed for the cross of Jesus, too. You will be against the flow if you try to explain about the meaning of the cross of Jesus to Muslims and you might go to prison.

So the cross of Jesus became shame and accusation to many Christians in the world.

What is the Bible teaching us?

The Bible teaches us to bear witness to love and peace between God and mankind to all the world through the cross of Jesus.

No matter the cost!

"May I never boast except in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, through which the world has been crucified to me, and I to the world." (Galatians 6:14) In the book of Esther, King Xerxes, at the prompting of an advisor named Haman issues a decree to exterminate the Jewish people. A Jewish official named Mordecai discovers the plot and informs his cousin, Queen Esther. He begs Esther to go before the king in order to save the people of Israel. There is a catch, though. It is against the law for anyone, even the queen, to go before the king without being summoned. While Esther is weighing the potential consequence of appearing before the king uninvited, she asks Mordecai to encourage the Jews to join her in her deliberation.

Esther 4:16 "Go and gather all the Jews of Susa and fast for me. Do not eat or drink for three days, night or day."

The same spirit of unity Esther encouraged as she gathered the strength to appear before Xerxes applies to the West Hills pastor search process. We on the PNC ask you to join us in united prayer over this entire process as you did on May 23rd. Set aside some time each day to pray for the next pastor of West Hills. Pray for continued unity on the PNC in our discernment process as we evaluate candidates and move closer to selecting the next Senior Pastor for West Hills.

Pray for the next pastor and his or her family. Pray for a smooth transition as they settle into a new normal at West Hills. Pray that God is preparing his or her heart for what He has in store for West Hills next.

Pray for the West Hills family. Pray we would remain open to the Holy Spirit's work in our midst. Pray that we would accept change as we move into the next chapter of our story. Pray that we will embrace our next leader and their family and engage in relationship with them quickly.

Pray that we will continue to follow the path God has set for us in this search. And pray for the future of West Hills as we embark on the grand adventure God has in store for us as we work for His glory.

The rest of the story is familiar. The people join Esther in prayer, she goes before King Xerxes, he hears her plea and reverses the decree. God rescued the people of Israel, and at the center of the story is prayer and preparation. God has great things in store for us at West Hills - let's keep prayer at the center.

On Saturday, April 20, our church responded to the need of two West Hills families who were impacted by the flood: Kayla Wilson and her parents, Tom and Kelly Wilson. Kayla and her sister Kylee found their homes destroyed in the mobile home park. Tom and Kelly found their home damaged and their mobile home business destroyed by the Nebraska floods. There is much work to be done and six of our congregation members stepped up and volunteered for clean-up work at their property.

Kayla's parents' home was built in 1886 and was a hotel and saloon.



In the 1880s a railroad station was just across the train tracks, which ran near their home. The home has been owned by the Wilson family since the 1930s. This is where family memories have been built and it is precious to them. They want to reclaim it from the flood waters and make it home again. The mobile home park is their livelihood and

mission field and it is in jeopardy. Please pray that they will get permission to rebuild it.

Ron Gatzke coordinated the work crew that included Fred Picavet, Terry and JoAnne Topolski, Paul Bates, and Bob Drake. The comment shared by one of the crew was, "We spent 3½ hours of fun filled destruction. "While five of the crew were enjoying the destruction, Paul was building stairs down to



the cellar so they could get damaged appliances out.

The work is still in the clean-up phase and there is an abundance of work to do. Please feel free to call Peg Shirley if you are interested in coordinating a time to help with clean-up efforts, 402-980-2650.

Please keep Kayla, Kylee and Tom and Kelly in your prayers and be sure to give them a hug on Sundays at church. God has called us to be brothers and sisters to one another. Runza Casserole

This is an oldie but goodie from Peg Shirley

Ingredients

- 2 pounds hamburger
- 2 chopped onions
- 4 cups chopped cabbage

salt and pepper

- 2 packages crescent rolls
- 1 pound shredded mozzarella cheese

Spread one tube of crescent rolls in 9" X 13" pan

Bake 7 minutes

Brown hamburger in a skillet, with onion, drain grease Add cabbage and let steam.

Salt and pepper to taste.

Spread meat mixture on top of the baked crescent rolls.

Sprinkle mozzarella cheese on top of meat.

Layer second tube of crescent rolls on top of meat mixture.

Bake 350°

25 to 30 minutes

Remove pan and cover with foil

Bake additional 10 minutes



Holding Nothing Back: Ernst Vatter: A Portrait of Perserverance by Ron Susek is a look into the life of a former Hitler Youth who later became a renowned missionary.



This book tells the story of a German teen who became involved in the Hitler Youth movement during World War II. Later when the Third Reich was defeated the same young teen found himself in prison living in squalid conditions with a fellow prisoner, a Christian, who carried God in his heart and gave the young man half of all his food.

According to the book's publisher, Christian Publications Inc., "Death, disease and danger pursued Ernst as God worked out His purposes in Ernst's life."

In later years Ernst and his wife Sigrid

were missionaries in Japan and he became the overseas director of Liebenzell Misson, which now manages approximately 250 missionaries in 22 countries.

The author, Ron Susek is an evangelist, Bible teacher and founder of Susek Evangelistic Association.



Check This Out: This twenty-eight minute video, is currently available in the Soul Café. The DVD discusses six different creation topics including:

Hi West Hills! My name is Ted Tromler and I am a deacon for Practical Needs. I'm sure you know exactly what I mean by that ... Just in case, my responsibilities are in coordinating Home Bound Communion and transportation for members to Sunday services. Recently, I was able to experience for myself what limited mobility and the need for transportation feels like. I have severe arthritis in my left knee and for most of this year, I was wearing a brace, using a cane and cursing all staircases. After a nerve block in early April, I'm mostly pain free (except those stupid stairs are still pretty mean). This experience helped me realize more fully how frustrating it can be to want to participate in an event and know it won't be possible due to a disability. I took my mobility for granted.



I want to update you on the current state of my ministries. For Home Bound Communion, we serve six individuals or couples regularly and a group at Westgate Assisted Living monthly. Since our

volunteers always serve in pairs, this means a minimum of fourteen servers each month. We have a core group of dedicated and selfless servers who volunteer whenever their schedules allow. As you can imagine, they are living very busy lives, but they set aside an hour or two each month to bring joy and fellowship to people who would love to attend service and take Communion with the whole congregation. We need more volunteers to help cover schedules and be back up when we add new recipients.

If you have been an Elder or Deacon in the past, you are qualified to give Home Bound Communion. Only one of the two servers needs to be qualified, and spouses are more than welcome! Contact me at tedlaressa@msn.com for more information or to volunteer.



Transportation is on an "as needed" basis. Like our Home Bound Communion recipients, those receiving a ride to church are so grateful. 
