Going To The Chapel by Les Peterson, Deacon for Stephen Ministry

What is a chapel?

It is a subordinate or private place of worship: such as

a: a place of worship serving a residence or institution

b: a small house of worship usually associated with a main church

c: a room or recess in a church for meditation and prayer or small religious services

2: a place of worship used by a Christian group other than an established church, a nonconformist chapel

3: a choir of singers belonging to a chapel

4: a chapel service or assembly at a school or college

5: an association of the employees in a printing office

6a: Funeral Home

b: a room for funeral services in a funeral home

Where can you find a chapel?

Well, many might say Las Vegas and wedding chapels.

Ever think about visiting a chapel when in an airport? In fact, more than half of the nation's busiest airports have dedicated chapels, and many of these facilities offer a variety of worship services for different faith traditions. I usually don't look for an airport chapel.

I do, however, look for a chapel when visiting someone in the hospital or nursing home.

So, why go to a chapel? Well, we have all been asked, where were you when...? You can fill in the blank with, when John F. Kennedy was shot, when the planes flew into the twin towers, or looking forward to Lent, were you there when they crucified my Lord.

But where were you when you prayed to God and he answered your prayer? Or gave you peace when going through a difficult time, or even when he did nothing? We always say it is not when we want things to happen, but it will happen in God's time.

I want to share some experiences where I can respond to where I was when...?

When my father was ill with Parkinson's disease. He was in Methodist Hospital and was receiving physical, occupational, and speech therapy. After two weeks, he was able to walk with his walker, feed himself, and speak clearly to us. There was joy that day between him, his caregivers and our family. Where was I during that time? Every time after visiting him and leaving the hospital, I was in the chapel, praying that God would heal him so that he would be able to enjoy life and be with family. He answered our prayers.

Another time, when Dad was back at Methodist: this time things were worse, he was not eating much other than ice cream. He could not get out of bed on his own. The doctors thought he could pass away in a couple of weeks. Where was I? Well I was at the chapel praying that he would be able to be with us a while longer. Dad left the hospital to a nursing home and I was able to visit and talk with him for another six months until he passed away.

When my brother was deathly ill with a heart valve problem: He was in Chicago and I was summoned to come quickly that there was a chance he would not make it unless they replaced the mitral valve in his heart. He had his atrial valve replaced seven years prior and now another valve surgery was needed.

We were all in a waiting room that day while he was in surgery. As you would imagine there was tension in the room with all family members, friends, and my brother's pastor. About every hour, I would want to get away. My sister-in-law would ask, Les, where are you going? My response, was, I am going to the chapel. I went every hour that day to pray in silence that the surgery would be successful. After nine hours of surgery, the surgeon came out and all he did was give a thumbs up and we knew it was successful. I would like to think that my time in prayer as well as others had something to do with the outcome.

A few years later, when my brother had stage 4 colon cancer: He was in Chicago and he was receiving hospice care. I was with family and friends and needed to pray. Again, my sister-in-law asked me, where are you going; my reply, I am going to the chapel. I went to pray for God to give us peace during this time. Sadly, my brother went to be with the Lord, but I was there for him.

So, why go to the chapel and pray? I say, why *not* go there. It is a place for meditation and prayer. It is always a comfort to me to go there and pray. Other events in my life have led me there, I went there before my sister passed away at Hospice House; when my mom passed away at Bellevue Medical Center.

I have shared with you those times where the outcome was not what I wanted but I was able to deal with those situations by being in prayer.

Other chapel visits resulted in rejoicing, praising God for answering my prayers and I know where I was when I felt his presence.

I guess I am comfortable with sitting in a chapel. At West Hills, I attended the 8:15 service, where else but the chapel. Just remember, it's not where you were, church, work, home, car, airport, or chapel, it is the time you spent in prayer with God. Even though we do not have worship service there anymore, it does not mean that I can't go there and pray anytime.

I would encourage you to pray wherever you are comfortable; it will aid you in getting through the good and bad times. The most important thing is not where, or that you pray out loud or in silence but that you do it often. I believe it is a huge part of our journey with the living Christ.

Thank you for letting me share my experiences with you. I am sure that all of you have had similar experiences. Mine led me to become a Stephen Minister. If sitting in a chapel and praying is not for you and you want someone you can talk to and walk with you along the way, West Hills has many people that are ready, willing and able to be there for you.

- William Schoepner

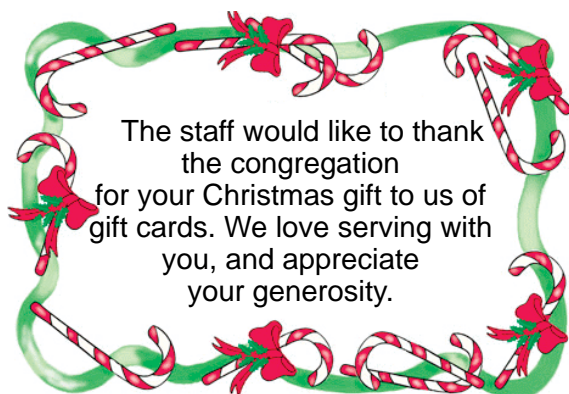
As a committee, we have committed to meet weekly, beginning the first week in January, so that we are able to move forward in the process as rapidly as possible.

Prayer Pager History 101

The West Hills prayer pager ministry began almost fifteen years ago. Deena had brought back the idea after hearing about it being done in her sister's church in Colorado. It was a little frightening for me as I'm somewhat technology challenged. But I learned how to use the pager and then figured out how to make it more "user friendly" so that everybody could use it without intimidation.

"This Week's Prayer Focus!"

On April 25, 2004, the pager was given to our first participant – Gerry West. Gerry had been fighting cancer for several years and loved having the pager "telling" her someone had just prayed for her! So with her glowing recommendations, the ministry took off! Over the next fourteen years, over 700 West Hills family and friends "felt" the power of prayer through a pager set to vibrate when called. Well, except for that week when Pete Peterson was in hospice and the pager accidentally went from vibrating to playing Happy Birthday. Thank goodness the Peterson family took this as a sign of Pete's NEW life about to begin and found humor in the situation!

A crucial part of this ministry has been our volunteers who have taken care of getting the pager back from one person and in the hands of the next, every Sunday. Most of the time this includes a quick tutorial on how to use the pager.

I want to say thank you to Kathy Cordes, for getting the kinks worked out of our "Sunday hand-off system" during those first couple years! And thank you to Laressa Tromler, who has so faithfully given her time every Sunday for the past twelve years! Besides giving them the pager and making sure they knew how to use it, she has blessed them with her kind heart and loving care! Laressa, you have been a blessing to so many people over the past twelve years, but most of all, to me and I thank you very much!

A lot has changed in the past fifteen years, and pagers are becoming a thing of the past. So we're moving on with the times and updating our prayer ministry! Beginning January 7, the bulletin will still have the outlined section with two prayer requests, for you to pray for during the week. The first request will be from one of our West Hills family members. The second request will be from one of our West Hills leadership people, either an elder, deacon, or staff member. We want to keep these folks lifted in prayer throughout the year, so will have a continuous rotation of the people in these positions.

So look for the familiar section with the new title **This Week's Prayer Focus!** You'll still pray – you just won't need to dial a pager number.

The pagers may be gone, but the important part remains unchanged -

Two Award Winning Recipes from The Christmas Experience



Start to Finish:
1 Hour
Makes: 36 Cookies

Ingredients

½ cup butter, soft
½ cup SunButter Natural
½ cup sugar,
additional sugar for rolling

½ cup packed brown sugar
1 egg
1-1¼ cups all-purpose flour
¼ cup cocoa powder
¾ teaspoon baking soda
½ teaspoon baking powder
½ cup semi-sweet chocolate chips
36 chocolate kisses (plain chocolate variety),
unwrapped

Directions

1. Heat oven to 375° F. In large bowl, cream butter and SunButter together until smooth. Add sugars and mix for 2 to 3 minutes until smooth and creamy. Add egg, beating until combined.
2. Stir in flour, cocoa powder, baking soda, and baking powder until dough forms. Stir in chocolate chips until combined. Shape dough into 1-inch balls; roll in additional sugar. Place on cookie sheet.
3. Bake 8 to 10 minutes or until edges are light golden brown, immediately press 1 Kiss candy in center of each cookie. Remove from cookie sheets to cooling rack. Serve immediately or refrigerate.

OATMEAL LACE COOKIES



½ cup butter
1 cup packed brown sugar
1 tablespoon flour
2 teaspoons vanilla extract
½ teaspoon salt
1 large egg, slightly beaten
1 ½ cups rolled oats

Preheat oven to 350° – line baking sheet with parchment paper. (I grease pan so paper will lie flat).

Melt butter and brown sugar in medium saucepan over medium heat. Stir frequently until butter and brown sugar melt into a thick paste.

Remove from heat and stir in flour, vanilla and salt. Set aside for 10 minutes to cool.

Mix in egg and oats and stir well.

Spoon 1 teaspoon batter onto baking sheet leaving space for cookie to spread. Use back of spoon to spread cookie dough into a thin circle.

Bake in oven for 7-8 minutes until edges turn brown. Let cookies cool before removing from parchment paper – about 5 minutes.

Melt chocolate for dipping. Add 2 teaspoons of oil or Crisco to thin chocolate.

Dip in melted chocolate on half of cookie or spread on bottom of one cookie bottom and lay another on top for a sandwich. You can also drizzle chocolate over cookie, whether one or two layers.
