A SEASON TO FOLLOW by Andy Hamer, Pastor

At many points in his ministry Jesus invites people to, "follow me". In first century Judaism, this was the language of education. A rabbi would offer select people the opportunity to learn his interpretations of the Old Testament. More than that, the students would travel or live with the Rabbi in order to understand how he lived out his faith convictions. These students were learning to live their faith; "Follow me," was an invitation to discipleship. In our time, Jesus might have said, "You've been admitted to my school. Come with me, and learn what I have to teach. Let me show you how to live it."

Our current social media term, "follow", has some echoes of discipleship. Of course, we don't commit our lives to someone we "follow" on social media, and there are many reasons to follow someone on social media: friendship, admiration, animosity. Yet, we must acknowledge that the people and institutions we follow affect us, and in some cases, the effects are frequent and significant.

Whom do we follow?

In recent decades lifestyle shifts have made us increasingly plugged-in, tuned-out, overworked, and under-fulfilled. With all the other influences (and "influencers") bombarding us, it can be challenging to hear the voice of our true RabBi. If I take an honest look at my own life, I can see this competition for my focus. It's not that I need to abstain from TV, the internet, or from hanging out with people who haven't met Jesus. It's just that I need to regularly touch base with the one I claim guides my values and actions, my hopes and plans. If I want to actually follow Jesus in any kind of real way, I need connection that is frequent and significant.

Whom do I follow?

We might also take this question another way. On the one hand we consider our choices and priorities. On the other hand, we consider the identity of those who influence us. To draw another example from social media, we have discovered

that people don't always accurately represent themselves online - they aren't always their "real" selves. This sometimes leads media consumers into misinformation, or to believe that their own lives are less perfect, less worthy. Do we hold similar misconceptions about who Jesus is?

Do we know the One we're following?


Let's start with the basics; what about Jesus' profile picture. A quick Google image search reveals a shocking variety of ideas of what Jesus looks like. This points toward a couple of facts: 1. We don't know exactly what Jesus looks like, and 2. Most cultures seem to picture Jesus looking a lot like themselves. Okay, looks aren't everything, so what was Jesus really like? The Gospels describe a fairly complex individual. Even in the last few days before lesus' crucifixion we see him challenging the leaders of his nation and then weeping at the death of friend. He approaches Jerusalem "gently" riding on donkey and then later angrily flips over the tables of the Temple money changers. He allows a woman to anoint his feet with perfume and her own hair, and then later humbly washes all of his own disciples' feet. And that's just scratching the surface - Jesus himself tells us that he is God's Son, the bread of life, the Vine, the Good Shepherd, and our friend. Beyond that, have we explored all the dynamics revealed in his teaching, his purpose, and his relationships?

Whom do we follow?

The season of Lent is a great time to be asking these questions. In ancient times, the weeks before Easter were a common time for people to prepare for baptism. For those who had already been baptized, this season was a time to reflect on Jesus' sacrifice and also on their own commitment to follow Jesus. Could we not all use this? To aid us in this reflection, each Sunday in Lent we'll consider the, "I am" statements that Jesus makes in John's Gospel. This Lent I hope you'll join me in taking a step back to honestly consider whose disciples we're becoming.

LEANING INTO LENT WITH KIDS by Jessica Scheopner, Dir. of Family Ministries



Lent began on Ash Wednesday (March 2 this year), it is a perfect "excuse" to make a space for your kids to think about God. Lent is a season set aside for considering who God is, who we are, and why we need him. If we are honest with ourselves, the time is marked by repentance and humility. It is a time to consider the cycle of living, dying, and rising as a new creation. It's heavy.

So why is this a good thing to invite kids into?


- Children and teens are spiritual beings, and like adults they have a yearning to connect with God at the exact stage they are at now. It won't be the same way next year - for any of us!
- They are already familiar with or learning about the life/death/rise again cycle, and it is on display in nature during the winter/spring that wraps around the time of Lent.
- Kids can read or have the Bible read to them; we can encourage this together.
- They get to practice saying I'm sorry, and experience forgiveness in the safety of the home and the safety of their church family.
- Kids learn best alongside us how to look outside of themselves, how to pray for and give to others to show God's love. There are many natural chances to practice this together.

What does it look like to lean into Lent in a busy household?

It looks like whatever you can adapt to work for your family! And it doesn't look perfect - our Lenten practices are a reflection of us, and that imperfection is the whole reason we need Lent, Holy Week, and Easter!

- Maybe you take these 40 days to add in some scripture, music and prayer during breakfast or on the drive to school.
- Maybe you have already pinned some ideas.
 If so, please jump onto the <u>West Hills parents'</u>
 <u>FB group</u> and share away!
- Maybe you have a Lenten practice you can let them watch and invite them to participate in at their level. Kids can read scripture, pray, fast, and give in ways that are age-appropriate.

There is no wrong way to do it, but there are small, simple ways you can invite kids into a spiritual journey. Lent is a natural time to make space for people of all ages to ask faith questions and look for answers together in this season.





THE WORK OF GOD PERSEVERES

Despite the great impact of the COVID pandemic, God's work continues to be accomplished all across the world. In Ecuador, West Hills supports two ministries: For His Children (FHC) and Pastor Rafael Yuguilema.

FHC lives out the following mission:

"Believing that all children are created in God's image, For His Children exists as a Christ-centered ministry to homeless children, providing care in a loving and supportive environment, striving to unite them with their biological or adoptive family, and advocating on their behalf to others."

2021 was a crazy year for FHC. In just last year alone, over 44,895 meals were served, 29,200 diapers were changed, and 17,885 bottles were made. Through support from churches all over, they were able to provide personalized care to 51 children at FHC. In addition, three children were reunified with their biological families, and one child met his forever family through adoption. Government lockdowns in 2020 created significant delays in processes for reunification and adoption, which resulted in fewer children joining their biological or adoptive families in 2021. FHC is focused on ensuring every child needing care knows they are created in God's image and deeply loved. By means of trauma-informed caregiving, giving each child a short-term family through FHC while awaiting reunification or adoption, and being a forever family for young adults who have passed the legal age of adoption, each child receives the highest quality care. Above all, their goal is to help the children and staff grow in their knowledge and faith in Jesus Christ.

There is much to look forward to in 2022 for FHC. At the campus in Latacunga, everyone is thrilled about the opening of a new therapy pool (will open soon!). This will allow children to swim and receive therapy onsite, thanks to many generous donors. Also, at Latacunga, they've been able to expand their young adult care by having an occupational caregiver come and assess each young adult's capabilities. This is done with the goal of improving confidence and independence. Finally, with COVID restrictions lifting, everyone is excited about this summer when children from both Quito and Latacunga will be able to play together and create new memories!

In the mountains of central Ecuador, God is at work through the ministry of Pastor Rafael. He and his family focus on ministering to the Quichua youth and families in central Ecuador by organizing and presenting workshops and conferences, carrying out individual family visits, as well as doing couples counseling. I received the following from him in January. The letter was graciously translated by Melinda Vaughn, a mighty servant of God who is the co-founder of FHC and served as co-director for over 25 years.

We are well here - except for our oldest daughter, Elena, who was surprised and robbed by two men in the city of Ambato. Thanks to God, she is ok, but they did steal her bag with all her ID and other papers in it. She is now working on the time-consuming task of replacing everything. Our youngest daughter, Janneth, has finished her studies in the university. We are waiting for news of the date of her graduation ceremony. Things are up in the air with this new wave of Omicron. Perhaps it will be held in February. To you all, we wish you a very happy New Year 2022

Thank you very much for your interest in our ministry here in Ecuador and your email to us, Michael, sent by way of Melinda.

We continue in most of our usual activities - we have added an additional Bible study class just for women, so we now have two. We were hoping to reopen classes and church services with everyone attending physically, but with Omicron, we have not been able to do that. We had started to visit worship centers (churches and churches meeting in homes) in Quito and Guayaquil, as we used to do, but we have had to suspend these visits.

For some years now, we have wanted to build facilities for ministry in the town of Calpi, near the larger city of Riobamba. Again, because of the pandemic, we have suspended our planning. Contributions to our ministry from the local churches have been reduced, as well as financial support for me as pastor. However, we will continue with our online Bible studies for men as well as with the women. The main idea is to lift up the Christ-centered church! We have been holding Bible studies now for three years with the men of various churches and two years ministering to the women's groups. We know

ministering to the women's groups. We know God is mightily at work! We continue to give conferences focused on strengthening the family as well as counseling services. We have others collaborating with us in these online activities. We are thankful for this technology that permits us to continue working for His glory. Our thanks and appreciation overflow for your prayers and the support you send us. We hope that some day in the future we can make that trip to the U.S. as we had started to plan a while back. God knows when the timing is right for that! Once again, thank you very much, dear Sisters and Brothers at West Hills Church. May the Lord bless you all. We will be in touch soon.

It has been several years since The Window ran a story on some of the married couples in our church. Since one of the goals this year at West Hills is to build more relationships with one another, we thought the timing would coincide with the Spiritual Formation and Discipleship Committee's offering of gatherings before church to "get to know one another better," which were held in the Chapel on Sunday mornings in February. The following married couples agreed to share some insight into their marriage and their relationship over the years.

Tom and Lisa Backer met over 29 years ago after



a church service they both attended in South Africa. They got to know one another better while attending an adult Bible Study group, and they married four years later. Tom was first impressed with Lisa's memory and ability to make and keep long-lasting commitments to people.

while Lisa felt Tom's sense of direction added to his capacity to integrate his knowledge with creativity. According to Lisa and Tom, attending church every week and reading a daily devotional and praying together are all strong foundations for their marriage and their two children.

One of the challenges they identified in their marriage was bridging any differences that may have surfaced over the years and persevering through life's many trials. Looking back, they felt less time could have been spent not trying to change one another and more time trying to understand each other. Something that many couples who have been married for many, many years have expressed! Having and raising children together "has been a great blessing," they said.

They both have "adopted" 1 Corinthians 13 as a very important scripture passage in their life and shared that the church has always been part of their marriage "through connecting with wonderful couples and individuals who we came to know through small groups and later as treasured friends." Their advice to couples who are planning to marry is to "marry in a church with members of your congregation present to witness your vows and commit to you and your life as a married couple." Good advice from such a mature and loving couple.

They both have been involved with volunteer activities at West Hills and, besides attending weekly church services, also attend classes, which they shared contributed to their Christian growth.

Looking back, Julie and Mark can recall some very challenging times when their four children were under the age of 4! "Thank goodness we were together to support one another," Julie said. "Doing life together was key. Leaning on the other person makes things easier." Even though those times were very busy and trying, "we wouldn't trade them for anything." Terry lived in Nebraska, and Marti lived in Michigan, so for five years, their dating relationship was long-distance until Marti moved to Nebraska.

Terry and Marti not only enjoy entertaining audiences with their clowning skits, but they also enjoy bicycling, brewing beer, flying stunt kites, traveling, and working on home projects together. They shared that their faith in God "is the thread that binds every aspect of our marriage."

Worshipping at West Hills, they said, helped them as individuals, as well as a couple, to stay true to the faith that they each brought into their marriage. They shared that their Bible verse, Ephesians 4:32, "speaks to us in all situations." Terry and Marti have built such a strong marriage and friendship over the

They shared many similar interests: "God, family, music, dancing, the simple things in life," they said, which brought them together. Karen said that Al "is a very talented musician, being able to play any instrument with strings and plays all kinds of music except rap." Karen loves sewing, beginning when she was in elementary school and 4-H. It is her "creative release."

Al and Karen shared that they solve problems in their marriage by talking over issues "calmly and determining a plan of action. We each had gone through enough life before meeting that we pretty much go with the flow. It always works out in the end. God is in control." Al and Karen believe that married couples need a shared belief "in God the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit." Dating is also important, "to keep the flame alive, even though married, the pursuit is still on."

They also felt that two-way communication/ dialogue on a daily basis was very important, as well as an understanding that couples "are putting 100% into the marriage as each of them has strengths the other does not have. Do little things for each other out of love." Al and Karen shared that "together we have balance in life and we hold each other accountable to be the best person we can be. We are one another's sounding board/reality check." Their favorite Bible verse is Ephesians 6:10-20, which certainly emphasizes their walk with God in their marriage. Karen is currently serving as Elder for Caregiving.

Connie said she "also feels his strength in the way he takes care of me when I need to be taken care of." Matt shared that Connie is a great mother and "handles whatever I throw at her, letting me do and try different things."

They enjoy being in a small group and often pray together, something they advise newlyweds to do, as well as to love one another "as God loved you." Over the years, the Hucks have shared that they still have fun together after thirty years of marriage "in all that we do." Matt is currently serving as Elder for Stewardship, and Connie is serving as one of two Deacons for Homebound Ministry.

Jason and Jessica Scheopner met when they were freshmen at University of Nebraska at Kearney. They have been married for 27 years and have five children. The couple shared that



"God has woven us together in ways that were better than ours since we didn't ask Him if we should marry, and through the years, we can tell it has all been through grace."

Jessica said that Jason "is a quiet and cheerful morning person and a wonderful gift. His integrity and his notice of and care for the overlooked and vulnerable is one of his strengths." Through the years, Jason learned that Jessica loves to be outdoors, which "has led to some really fun adventures. I also admire Jessica's compassionate heart, deep faith, and tenacity, which has helped

us walk through some difficult times as a couple and a family."

They attended church together in college and when they joined West Hills "found a faith community which has always been important in our marriage and something we have continued to share with our children." They shared that due to their children's variety of needs, they have found it difficult "as well as challenging" to find time to be alone together. However, through the years, they have learned "to communicate clearly our expectations and shared approaches to solving problems."

They believe that West Hills has given them the opportunity to grow in their faith "as well as learn from other church members who are walking out their own faith." Jessica and Jason shared that at West Hills, "we have been cared for, mentored and deeply influenced by wise, skilled, thoughtful, loving people who are following Jesus." Their favorite Bible verse is Romans 8:28. Their advice to couples planning to marry is to "seek God first, serve one another, and seek help during the rough times from a trusted couple, pastor, or counselor." They related what Jessica's grandfather always said to them every time we parted: "Be good to one another." Jessica is currently the Director of Spiritual Formation and Family Ministries for West Hills Church.

- Session approved the motion to create a team to focus on the use of our facility for both internal and external ministry and for potential revenue-generating opportunities. The team will include the elders from Building and Grounds, Finance, and Intergenerational Impact, along with representation from Mission, Children and Youth, Stewardship, Staff, and individuals from the congregation.
- In a cost-cutting move, we're looking at mowing the church lawn with our own equipment and with a combination of staff and members.
- The elders are reading and discussing the book Disunity in Christ by Christena Cleveland.
- Per the Session vote at the August 17, 2021, Meeting, Staff and Ministry Teams are making COVID response decisions as needed. The Mask Requirement will likely shift (in many Ministry Areas) to 'optional' when Omaha's mask mandate expires.

- 1. Prayer is an act of communication with God "God calls us to pray in order to develop and deepen relationships with Him."
- 2. Prayer is an act that shows our dependence on God. "It is an admission that we need God's help to live a fruitful and productive life."
- 3. Prayer is an act of making my requests known to God. "God wants us to ask Him for what we want and need from Him"
- 4. Prayer is an act of cooperation with God. "Prayer is God's way of letting us partner with Him to accomplish His purposes."

The free Echo app gives you the ability to:

- 1. Quickly write down a prayer request as it comes to you.
- 2. Create prayer lists that you can refer to during your daily prayer activity.
- 3. Be reminded to pray by setting up push notifications or emails to remind you to pray for individuals or even groups of prayers.
- 4. You can also categorize your prayers with tags, delete old prayers, and mark your answered prayers so that you can remember to thank Him as well.

Pumpkin Cinnamon Streusel Cake (Gluten-Free)



Ingredients:

1 Krusteaz Gluten Free Cinnamon Swirl Crumb Cake

½ of 15 oz can of Libby's Pure Pumpkin (replaces oil)

4 eggs

¼ cup water

Preheat oven to 375 degrees Grease/Spray pan - 8×8 . (Can use 9×13 and double the recipe.)

Mix eggs, water, and pumpkin together until well mixed.

Add cake mix and stir until no dry spots.

Pour half of cake mixture in pan.

Cover with half of the included crumb mix. Layer rest of cake mixture on top and spread evenly over the first layer.

Add remaining crumb mix on top until covered. Sprinkle with powdered sugar if desired.

Bake 40-50 minutes and test middle with a knife until it comes out clean.

Serve with whipped cream or ice cream.


FOURTH FRIDAYS WITH INTERVARSITY by Joanne Topolski

THE SACRED OVERLAP LEARNING TO LIVE FAITHFULLY IN THE SPACE BETWEEN

In the book "The Sacred Overlap: Learning to Live Faithfully in the Space Between" by J. R. Briggs, the author uses Jesus' life work to give

the reader an understanding of both evangelism and discipleship in a time, like ours, where polarization exists. Today polarization is prominent in our society and too often lends itself to an "us vs. them" mentality. "The Sacred Overlap" examines life in complex biblical times, just like our world today, while adhering to biblical integrity.

According to the publisher, in this book the author:

- Shares creative ways to engage in God's mission of ministering to those intrigued by Jesus but turned off by the church.
- Explores what it means to be joyful amidst heart-wrenching pain and earthly suffering.
- Models what it means to maintain a posture of convicted civility which emphasizes both grace and truth.

In "The Sacred Overlap," we find that every day Christians are required to live in two separate worlds. One world is heaven and the other earth. Briggs points out that we as Christians must live naturally with both the sacred and the ordinary. In doing this, we become a witness and a disciple.

According to Amazon, J.R. 


