About 15 years ago, I wandered into West Hills Church hungry for spiritual renewal. I had always thought of myself as a Christian, even though I hadn't attended church in the previous 25 years.

I honored God for that hour, but the rest was my time. Then one Sunday, for a reason unknown at the time, I decided to attend a class.

Wow, was I way out of my comfort zone! The class was "How to Be a World-Class Christian," facilitated by Kathy and René Padilla. My mind is not so sharp anymore, but if I recall, my classmates were Ken and Jane Powers, Jana Prescott, Julie Burgess (and maybe Steve), and Pam Moore. I was made to feel comfortable, despite not knowing a thing about the Bible.

Fifteen years later, and despite a two-year absence, I rarely missed a Sunday class in that time. Am I a biblical scholar – hardly. But, taking that risk has led me to understand my relationship with God, Christ, and the Holy Spirit. So many have encouraged me to grow in faith and understand my gifts, including the ultimate gift of Grace given freely through the sacrifice of Christ. This knowledge has led to freedoms knowing the Love of God is all I need. And, let's not forget the friendships made along the way.

WHEN IS THE BEST TIME TO START A SMALL GROUP?

It was January 2020, COVID-19 had just been found in China, Megan Markle and Prince Harry left the Royal family, and I was on Facebook reading about the drone sightings in Western Nebraska. It was at this time that my husband Mike and I were determined to get involved in a small group at West Hills to develop deeper relationships with others.

We found three other couples who were also "empty nesters," and we started to meet two times per month with our focus on doing a book study, prayer, and occasional social events. What a time to start a small group! Who knew what the rest of 2020 would bring? Who knew we would stop going to church in person? Who knew we would only see faces through a computer screen? Fortunately, our small group continued to meet via zoom when the "lockdown" started. What a blessing it was to have meaningful conversations and support for each other during this time. Our small group kept me connected to West Hills Church as my "church in miniature" since I was not attending worship/seeing others in the church building on Sundays.

Historically, West Hills Church has encouraged and facilitated all members to be involved in a small group. The goal of the small group ministry is to encourage participants to develop deep relationships with others so they can grow, learn, live, and worship with each other. Our most crucial mandate for small groups is to meet the members' needs and maintain healthy group dynamics. Everything else is pretty flexible.

Groups members can decide how they want their small group to be, but generally we recommend a few things. The total number of members is between 6 and 12, and they have something in common. There is equal status among members, and leadership duties are shared or divided fairly among members. The focus or purpose of the group can be educational, support, social, mission, or a combination of these elements.

There are several ways to get involved in a small group at West Hills. You can reach out to one of the small group deacons or other members to see if there is an opening in an existing group. You can initiate the development of a new small group by gathering friends or acquaintances or by attending the Sample Small Group, which will start in January 2022. The purpose of a Sample Small Group is twofold; first, to experience a "Sample" of group life with only a four-session commitment, and second, to learn healthy group dynamics.

The deacons for Small Groups are here and available to help you or your small group. We have video and written resources and can even offer in-person coaching to make your group the best it can be. Please reach out to us if you need anything and watch for more information on the Sample Small Group in January 2022.

Candy and I have been serving lunches with others from West Hills at the Omaha Street School once a month for about 17 years. I felt called to volunteer after I retired from public school teaching. I heard John Parsons, the director, speaking at a West Hills Men's Retreat at Camp Calvin Crest. The Omaha Street School is an alternative high school for students who have not found success in a traditional school setting. The OSS is often a last chance for at-risk students to receive a high school diploma. When I visited the school, I could feel God's spirit amongst the staff. My volunteer application turned into a 5-year commitment to teach science. We now have many volunteers from West Hills who serve at the school.

- The Elders completed discussion of the book "Joining God, Remaking the Church, Changing the World".
- Men's Game Day has been set for March 5, 2022.
- Approved the motion to accept the revised Elder for Finance Job Description.
- Briefly discussed a developing conversation amongst WHC Ministry Teams about the possible benefits Christians might gain from understanding the implications of recently revealed racial disparities in Nebraska prisons.
- Approved a motion noting that Session revisited the creation of the discussion forums to productively address pertinent issues and has shifted the focus to the strategic priority of building deeper relationships which are vital to future discipleship and mission. Go Build Relationships!
- A Congregational Meeting will be held on November 21, 2021 following the 10:00 a.m. worship service for the purpose of electing Elders, Deacons, and members of the Nominating Team and to approve the proposed changes to WHC By-Laws and Articles of Incorporation.

SOMETHING OLD, SOMETHING NEW, PART III

For the past few months, we've been exploring the reasons we have long practiced intergenerational ministry at West Hills Church. If you missed one of these posts, you can catch up on the definition and history of intergenerational ministry at WHC <u>here</u> and the reasons it's important for our church family's growth <u>here</u>. *Our strategic priority nails it, too:*

Deeper relationships are vital to future discipleship and mission. Go Build Relationships!

[with people who are younger and older than you].

We grow together when we spend time together. That's how we build deeper relationships. So how can we spend time with people who are in a seemingly different place in life than we are? It's quite simple, but it takes a little effort: We need to go where they are. As the timeless philosopher Winnie the Pooh says, "You can't stay in your corner of the Forest waiting for others to come to you. You have to go to them sometimes."

What do we do when we go where people of other generations are?

- We might share a hobby or a learning experience.
- We might play a game.
- We might serve with a mission partner.
- We might attend a class, play, concert, or sporting event.
- We might share a meal.
- We might do a project together.

But don't miss this: the activity really doesn't matter. No matter what outward thing we are doing together, the real, inward activity is to listen with empathy and intention. We listen with suspended judgment and solutions. We just listen to the person's heart and let them know we care. That's it.

Another leadership magician, **Walt Disney**, reminds us: "the way to get started is to quit talking and begin doing." Here are some easy ways you can get started or go further in building relationships with people who are older or younger than you:

Easy Sunday wins:

- 1. Look around the sanctuary for someone you don't know yet and go meet them.
- 2. Hang out in the Geneva Lounge for a few minutes after worship.
- 3. After worship, linger a few minutes in the Geneva Lounge to meet or talk to someone of a different generation. Ask them a question AND a follow-up question.
- 4. Greet them again the next week.

Spend a little more time:

- Go to a kid's sporting event, concert, recital, or play. Call the church office if you'd like help making these connections.
- Send a note to someone whose gifts or talents you've noticed.
- Invite neighbors, friends, or family members to come with you to Cookies and Cocoa on December 10 (or if you prefer, come ready to join a table with another household).
- Worship online in the nursery once a month to be a welcoming presence for families with young children.
- Host a small group of InterVarsity college students for dinner in your home.
- Learn names and faces using the new church directory. And if you didn't get your picture taken yet, call TODAY to be part of this easy, free way to build community!
- Sign up for Servant Sunday next spring.

Challenge yourself even more:

- Consider joining the upcoming short term intergenerational mission trip.
- Join the all-ages leadership team that plans and leads VBS.
- Invite a family or small group of people of different generations to meet for lunch together after church.
- Let the church staff know you're interested in mentoring a child, teenager, or young adult.
- Let the church staff know you'd like to build a relationship with one of our homebound members.
- Join an intergenerational small group or Bible study (many of our groups and studies are already intergenerational!)
- Plan to be part of the next West Hills ~Church Family~ Camp.

MOST IMPORTANT: Have fun building relationships as you get to know and understand people of all generations in our WHC family, your neighborhood, and our community at large. God made this beautiful church family and wants us to ENJOY fellowship with Him and with one another!

RECIPE OF THE MONTH by Maralee Gifford



4 large pork chops (1 - 1 ½ in)

1 tbsp. olive oil - divided 1 tbsp. paprika 2 tsp. onion powder 2 tsp. garlic powder 1 tsp. salt 1 tsp. pepper 1 tsp. oregano

Drizzle 1 tbsp. oil on pork chops. Mix seasonings - sprinkle on top of chops on both sides

Oven 400 degrees - Bake 18 minutes - Put 1 tsp. butter on top - Cover -- Let rest for 5 min.

THE NUTS AND BOLTS OF STEPHEN MINISTRY by Laura Meyers

In 1975, Dr. Kenneth Haugh, a pastor and clinical psychologist in St. Louis, Missouri, found there were so many pastoral needs within his congregation that he couldn't keep up with the demand. He decided to live out the Bible passage in Ephesians 4:12, "equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ," and Stephen Ministry was born. Today more than 600,000 people have trained as Stephen Ministers (laypeople who provide care to those who are hurting). More than one-anda-half million people have received care from a Stephen Minister in a formal one-on-one caring relationship. Millions more have been touched by this ministry in informal ways.



Stephen Ministry also has a long history here at West Hills, dating back to 1981. That is 4O years of successful ministry here at West Hills. For many of those years, it was thriving. Currently, however, we are in a season of rebuilding this fantastic ministry:

- We currently have 13 trained Stephen Ministers in our congregation. Many have also completed Leadership Training.
- Of those 13, we have two active Stephen Ministers willing to be "linked" with a Care Receiver to provide a structured one-to-one caregiving relationship.
- We have had two "linkings" this year and are working on a third. One linking was with a member of our congregation, and the second was with someone outside of our church.
- We also have two active Stephen Minister Leaders.

I would like to personally thank everyone who has been praying for our Stephen Ministry here at West Hills, as our prayers have been answered. I am excited to report that we are currently training five new Stephen Ministers who will receive a total of 50 hours of care ministry training. By the end of their training, they are well-equipped with the principles and skills to provide high-quality, Christcentered, emotional and spiritual care to others. We will continue to provide training opportunities in 2022. Let us know if you feel you may be called to this ministry.

Yes, I have a personal passion for this ministry, and I would love to see it succeed for another 40 years. But more importantly, Stephen Ministry is the epitome of relational ministry and aligns perfectly with the church's new strategic priority of relationships. A Stephen Minister shares oneto-one relational ministry with someone when they need it the most. Stephen Ministry is meant to be offered outside of the church as well. It is a proven tool to spread Christian love into the community. It has so much potential to reach out beyond our four walls. Stephen Ministers also build a special bond of Christian community and camaraderie within the group itself. Ask one of our current SM's in training - we really stretched them to explore their feelings with the group on Saturday in our last training session.

Please don't let our numbers fool you. We may be small, but we are mighty! If you are wondering if a Stephen Minister could be beneficial for you or a loved one, please contact any pastor or someone on the Stephen Ministry leadership team. God always provides, and we will connect you with a Stephen Minister.

ASK THE PASTOR

Q: If God knows our future, why pray?

A: This question reminds us that although prayer is a basic piece of our faith, we sometimes feel confused or uncomfortable with its practice.

Getting right to the heart of the matter, Jesus tells his disciples to bring their needs to God in prayer – even though the Father already knows their needs, (Mat 6:8-13, Luke 11:1-13)! Why?

Throughout the Scriptures prayer seems to affect change. Consider the prayers of Abraham, Moses, or even the early church, (Genesis 18:22-33, Exodus 33:12-23, Acts 12:5-12). Prayer is one way that God invites our participation in his mission to redeem the world. The vastness of this responsibility might overwhelm us if we forget that the Spirit guides us in how to pray (Romans 8:26-28), or that prayer is the expression of a relationship, i.e., if prayer is 'talking', then it is also 'listening'.

In his earthly life, Jesus prayed regularly. He was more closely connected with the Father than any human in history, and as result, he was powerfully successful in participating in God's mission. Jesus' connection to the Father was maintained through regular listening and talking. The Gospels are a highlight reel; they don't record every moment of Jesus' life. Yet Jesus' prayers are often mentioned – Luke alone records 10. In these prayers we see Jesus making requests for his needs, but also spending time alone with his Father. Prayer, as practiced and taught by Jesus, is both effective and relational.

FALL SERVANT SUNDAY by Peg Shirley

Servant Sundays are such a unique mission event at West Hills. We hold Servant Sundays twice a year. The spring event is for our neighbors in Westgate, and the fall event is for our neighbors and our West Hills members who need a little extra help.

IN THE STORMS OF LIFE, JESUS NEVER LEAVES by Jane Loeck

This devotion was written by Jane Loeck for the women's silent retreat in October to be used during an optional meditation time. We thought you might enjoy it too!

Mark 4:35-41 Jesus Calms the Storm

³⁵That day when evening came, He said to His disciples, "Let us go over to the other side." ³⁶Leaving the crowd behind, they took Him along, just as He was, in the boat. There were also other boats with him. ³⁷A furious squall came up, the waves broke over the boat, so that it was nearly swamped. Jesus was in the stern, sleeping on a cushion. The disciples woke Him and said to Him, "Teacher don't you care if we drown?" ³⁹He got up, rebuked the wind and said to the waves, "Quiet! Be still!" Then the wind died down and it was completely calm. ⁴⁰He said to the disciples, "Why are you so afraid? Do you still have no faith?" ⁴¹They were terrified and asked each other, "Who is this? Even the wind and the waves obey Him!"



We are in a boat with lesus. Our lives and situations in this crazy world can be compared to that of the fearful disciples in the boat. Think about it -- we're either heading into a storm. in the middle of a storm, or have come out of a storm! The Christian life is full of stormy seas.

In this passage we see the turmoil of the disciples in contrast to the power and peace of Jesus. The disciples are going about their business doing God's will. They get into the boat and just want to get to **the other side**. Then here comes the unexpected storm! We, like the disciples, forget the words of Jesus and panic. Instead of choosing faith over fear, we often choose fear over faith. We may even accuse Jesus of leaving and not caring! The sudden storms of life make us wonder, like the disciples, where is Jesus? Complete faith and trust in the Father is needed in times like these.

Sometimes the Lord's silence in our storm feels like He's asleep on a cushion in the boat! Yet, it is all part of His design to strengthen our faith and fulfill His plan. Life's storms are an opportunity to learn. The boat we're in is a test of our faith; there are lessons to be learned in the storms.

Jeff Stott in his "Truth Applied" online devotion writes that when a person comes out of a storm they are not the same. They view both self and Jesus differently because of what they have learned in the storm. Not all storms come to disrupt. Some may clear a path **to better see the other side**. We should view storms as an opportunity for God to display his sovereignty. "I have told you these things, so that in me you may have peace. In this world you will have trouble. But take heart! I have overcome the world." (John 16:33)

Our hope is in Jesus even in today's unstable world. He is with us in every kind of storm. He does not abandon us in our struggles – **HE NEVER LEAVES**. Nothing can separate us from His loving presence. Jesus has promised His presence for all time. "And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age." (Matthew 28:20)

Just as He did for the disciples in the boat, Jesus promises us His peace and presence. He gives us His Holy Spirit. Even when we don't realize it and think He's asleep on a cushion in the rear of the boat, He is with us! Jesus is in control of the storm, giving us His grace, provision and protection.

Leslie Gould states, "Sometimes God calms the storm but sometimes He lets the storm rage and calms His child." When the storms of life rock our boats, call on Jesus to calm the storm. Let your wind die down and be completely calm as you sail with Jesus.

"The Boy Who Came Back from Heaven" is a New York Times Best Seller by Kevin and Alex Malarkey. It is the true story of six-year-old Alex, who was paralyzed in a car crash in which his father, Kevin, was driving. Alex was the first child to receive the "Christopher Reeve" surgery which

allows him to breathe independently without a ventilator.

According to Tyndale House Publishers, -"When he (Alex) finally awoke from a two-month coma, he revealed something amazing: he had spent time in heaven with Jesus, while unconscious, and had come back with astonishing revelations about what he had seen, heard, and experienced."

Much of the book is told from the perspective of Alex's father, Kevin. As the parent, Kevin's emotions are intense and honest. Although he wants to erase the car accident and its aftermath from their lives, his faith demonstrates belief and persistence, ultimately revealing the power of prayer in any health crisis.
