LOOKING BACK BY ANDY HAMER, PASTOR

I'm grateful for those of you who have taken the time to tell me more of the stories of West Hills Church. This is, of course, immensely helpful to me, but it may also have value for those who have graciously taken the time to fill me in. In recent weeks I've had a series of these types of conversations with West Hills' ministry teams, Session, and staff. I asked them four questions (feel free to pause and answer them yourself):

- 1. What went well in the last few years?
- 2. What was hard about the last few years?
- 3. What still stings?
- 4. What excites you about moving forward?



These questions led us into insightful and heartfelt conversations. As we reflected on the past, we found an interesting mix of grief and hope. Consider your own responses: do any carry a certain weight in your heart? I would encourage you to share your thoughts with others.

In my reflections about these conversations I noted that many people showed an earnestness to "move forward." I personally identify with this feeling. In many life situations I find myself asking questions like, "Where do we go from here?" or "What's the next step toward the direction God is calling us?" In recent years however, I've been spending a bit more time looking back. As I consider our eagerness to move forward as a church, I wonder if there's anything more to gain from where we've been.

When I'm hiking in the backcountry I have a tendency to always want to go a little bit farther. I want to know what is around the next corner or over the next ridge. Of course, some of the great joys of the wilderness are found when we turn around to look at the view behind us. Along with the view, there's often an accompanying sense of accomplishment. Whether the path behind us was relaxed or grueling, no one can take away the fact that we ourselves have completed it. What have you gained by being a part of West Hills in these recent, challenging years? Those things are ours to keep.

Looking back can also provide a moment to take stock. How am I doing after that last stretch of trail? Is my heel rubbing uncomfortably in my boot now? Do I need to take the boot off and address the situation before it gets worse? As we take stock as a church, do we have any raw places inside of us? Now may be a good time to address them. God has set aside work for us to do as individuals and as a church. It's important to remember that he also cares enough about each of us to empower us through the Spirit to do our inward work. As the famous mountaineer Sir Edmund Hilary once said, "It is not the mountain we conquer but ourselves."

WHAT I LEARNED FROM SAMMIE

I have always enjoyed being a dog owner. All of my dogs have been Humane Society mixed breeds (mutts). After several years of just having one dog, I decided that two would be even better.

Fifteen years ago I went to the shelter and got a six-month old puppy named Samantha or "Sammie." Sammie was mix of Beagle, King Charles Cavalier, Jack Russell, and maybe a couple of other breeds. When Sammie was eighteen months old I decided to sneak her into a nursing home on a Saturday night to see a friend's mother.

Surprisingly, Sammie acted like she had visited nursing homes her whole life. She stopped at every wheelchair and patiently waited for people to pet her. She cuddled closely to my friend's mother on the bed. She stayed in that same position for about thirty minutes and when I left I had made the decision to see what it took to have her become an official therapy dog. No more sneaking around!

Sammie spent many years as a certified therapy dog. I used to say that she had a huge fan club. Sometimes when she was very content on a bed, I would joke that I could leave and she wouldn't even care. Which was 'sort of' true—I could leave the room and when I returned she would look up as if to say, "I knew you wouldn't leave me."

When Sammie was ten years old I got another puppy, MacKenzie (Macc). The two of them were great friends, one aging dog and the other a newly minted, exuberant puppy. Macc required a lot of exercise and Sammie would gamely go along at a more subdued pace. I started seeking large fenced areas where I could have them both off leash to go at their own pace.

It wasn't long before Macc would be far in the distance with me in the middle and Sammie lagging way behind. We began a pattern of me catching up with Macc and then both of us backtracking to find Sammie.

As she got older, Sam's eyesight diminished as well as her strength and endurance. I tried to leave her at home, but that met with the disapproval of both dogs. Finally, there came a time when she could just

go a short distance. She would lay on her stomach and survey the world through cloudy eyes. I knew she couldn't see me in the distance, but it never seemed to bother her. Stopping to rest when she was tired, looking around her at what she could see, and waiting for me to find her to take her home was enough. She never looked worried, rather she would gaze up at me as if to say, "I knew you wouldn't leave me." Such trust in me as her master!

Watching Sammie's calm acceptance of her limitations, I realized that this dog believed I would take care of her NO MATTER WHAT. I doubted that I had that much trust in my heavenly master. Day after day Sammie reminded me that through trials, failing health, and weakness, there could be trust that everything would be okay. How much more did the Lord love me than I could ever love my dog? Luke 12:6-7 Are not five sparrows sold for two pennies? And not one of them is forgotten before God. Why, even the hairs of your head are all numbered. Fear not; you are of more value that many sparrows. (Or many dogs, for that matter.)

Sammie was diagnosed with widespread cancer at the age of twelve and the veterinarian suggested that she be put to sleep. I agreed, and held her as she took her final breath. As I held her I thought about how infinitely more my Father cared for this dog and for me. How reassuring to know that I'm never going to be alone throughout the changes in my life. NOTHING will ever interfere with His love for me. Thank you Lord for the lesson in trust that I learned from Sammie.

There is quite a story behind Scatter Joy Acres, as the attendees of our Special Saturday program and potluck discovered. Yes, it has a petting zoo feeling with a camel, guinea pigs, ducks, goats, sheep, potbelly pigs, donkeys, alpaca, horses and seasonal baby animals. As Joy Bartling, executive director, explained, Scatter Joy Acres is "a place of rescue and a journey of peace."

The Lord rescued Joy in many of the most difficult seasons of her life. He constantly opened doors that could have so easily

stayed slammed tightly shut. Joy gave her moving testimony to those gathered in our Fellowship Hall as she told how the grace of God has flowed like a mighty river, from Him, to her and out to so many others.

Joy Bartling founded a ranch in 2006 called Soby Ranch Ministry which transitioned to Scatter Joy Acres. There are twenty-seven acres with lots of room for animals and activities. The animals quickly capture the hearts of young and old alike. Wide open spaces are available in a country

setting...salve to the weary soul! The setting allows visitors to be with nature and feel that rich calming effect that

those many animal ambassadors provide.



Joy also spoke of animal assisted therapy, animal rescue, as well as the difference creatures can make in prisons, hospitals, nursing homes, therapeutic boarding schools for teens as well as mental health facilities. Treatment takes place individually or in groups led by qualified therapists or specialized experts who guide each session. It seems that some people will interact differently with the animals. Sometimes barriers are broken and healing may have a chance to begin.

On Special Saturday at West Hills, Joy was accompanied by dogs, kittens and a bunny rabbit. Cuddling was encouraged! The SJA camel could not attend as he is preparing for his completely booked scheduled appearances as a participant in live nativity settings.

Following the presentations a delicious bounty of food was presented pot luck style. Can our members

put out a spread! Lively conversations took place around tables with individual gift bags decorated as pigs, horses, cows and more. The entire October gathering was fun, informative and thoroughly enjoyable.





RECIPE OF THE MONTH

SCIENCE & THE BIBLE

AFRICAN PEPPER SAUCE

provided by Peg Shirley



Ingredients:

- 5 habañero or scotch bonnet peppers
- 1 medium onion
- 4 garlic cloves
- 2 TBSP bouillon or maggi
- 2 basil leaves
- 2 TBSP parsley
- 3 roma tomatoes
- 1/2 cup vegetable oil

salt

Directions:

- 1. Chop the onion, tomatoes and peppers after removing the seeds and stems.
- 2. Put all the ingredients in a food processor or blender.
- 3. Pour the pepper mixture into a saucepan and bring to a boil, then simmer for 15 minutes, stirring frequently to keep it from burning.
- 4. It will be spicy hot. You can add mayonnaise to cool it down. Add as much as you need until you are ready to eat it.

African Pepper Sauce is meant to be spooned over meat, however you decide how you want to serve it.
