## TRUE WORSHIP by William Scheopner, Elder for Worship and Music



When someone mentions feeling the Holy Spirit in worship, what's your gut reaction? Is it visions of dancing, snakes, and speaking in tongues? Is it images of hands raised high, and eyes closed? Or is it worshippers kneeling

with folded hands? Is it the seeming lack of control that scares us? Does this lack of control energize our worship? Whether you're comfortable with discussing the role of the Spirit in worship, or whether it makes you a little uncomfortable, I think it's worthwhile to look deep into scripture and examine our own hearts as we become ever more aware of the Spirit in worship.

In Exodus 4O, we see that God's spirit was present in the tabernacle and that it could be felt powerfully there. It says, "*Then the cloud covered the tent of meeting and the glory of the LORD filled the tabernacle.*" God's presence was so powerful in the tabernacle that the books of the law give specific instructions for how the people of Israel are to interact with the tabernacle and the worship activities associated with it. In some ways, these guidelines form a liturgy – a formalized way of approaching worship.

In 2 Samuel 6, King David is so overwhelmed with his worship and praise of God's faithfulness that he dances, much to the finger-wagging of those around him. Scripture says that "David danced before the LORD with all his might." "It's undignified", the people around David declare. But David doesn't care. He says, "I will become even more undignified than this..."

I love the telling of this story in the words of the David Crowder Band,

I will dance I will sing To be mad for my king Nothing Lord is hindering this passion in my soul And I'll become even more undignified than this Some may say it's foolishness But I'll become even more undignified than this Leave my pride by my side And I'll become even more undignified than this Some may say it's foolishness But I'll become even more undignified than this

While the Presbyterian tradition can be lovingly (or scathingly) referred to as "The Frozen Chosen," I'm reminded of the rich theological roots of our liturgy, and the ways that the Spirit moves in our midst.

I write this as an encouragement to each of you. There is total freedom in worship. We've each been invited into the presence of the God of Abraham and Isaac, of Moses, of David. And our God delights in our worship. In the reverence of His tabernacle and in David's "undignified" rejoicing, God is pleased by our true worship.

What is true worship? In John 4, Jesus tells the woman at the well, "The hour is coming, and is now here, when true worshippers will worship the Father in spirit and truth for the Father is seeking such people to worship Him. God is spirit, and those who worship Him must worship in spirit and in truth." God is pleased by our true and authentic worship. In the coming weeks, I encourage you to dedicate some time to meditate on the Spirit's place in our worship. Whether corporate or individual, the Spirit is moving in our midst. Don't be ashamed to respond in action. To some, this may be about the silence, reverence, and awe of God's work in creation and our world. To others, this may be the physical act of raised hands and closed eyes.

We worship an audience of One. May we each do so in spirit and in truth.

# BOOK SUGGESTION

Have you ever been so upset about something someone did to you that you didn't think you'd ever be able to forgive them?

This is the subject of author, Lysa TerKeurst's book, "Forgiving What You Can't Forget: Discover How to Move On, Make Peace with Painful Memories, and Create a Life That's Beautiful Again."

According to Four Minute Books this book can be divided into the following three sections:

- 1. Being overly optimistic is just one of the many coping mechanisms that make it harder to deal with your traumas.
- 2. To forgive, follow the three step process of collecting, connecting, and correcting the dots of your past.
- 3. Forgiveness is a process not an event.

Although this book focuses on a troubled marriage, the lessons to be learned apply to all different aspects of a life that has been traumatized by a bad relationship.

Also, the book covers what the Bible really says about forgiveness and the peace that comes from living it out.

The author is president of Proverbs 31 Ministries. In addition, she is a # 1 New York Times best selling author.

## MAKING A CONNECTION by Ginny Jansen, Deacon of Caregiving

I have a confession to make—I sometimes have great intentions but I don't always find the time or determination to follow through. There are times when I plan to call someone later—but then I get busy with something else and it completely slips my mind. Or I buy a card to send to someone and the card gets buried in a stack of mail—and then I think it is "too late" to send it. Or I think about baking cookies or preparing a meal for someone but I am called upon to babysit and once again, my good intentions fall along the wayside. I imagine that a few of you can relate.

We are all called by God to be caregivers. I doubt if any of us do everything God intends. All of the changes made necessary by COVID have added stumbling blocks to what we should be doing. That became an easy excuse to stay in our own little bubble. Unfortunately, it is easy to stay in our little world. I have talked to members of our congregation who felt alone during difficult times while we were praying for them in church or on the prayer chain. While we were praying, no one told them that we were praying. Some others I have talked to decided to back away from West Hills because even the friends that they talked to regularly on Sundays didn't reach out to ask if they were okay or if there was a reason that they hadn't returned to services.

I realize that I am an old fashioned farm girl-but I grew up going to Sunday meals at Grandma's. I am carrying on that tradition. Our kids and grandkids know that lunch will be available after church on Sunday. There are weeks when not everyone can make it. Sometimes things like traveling for work or a soccer or baseball game or an activity with the other side of the family enter into the schedule. My family knows that nothing is mandatory-however, they are always welcome-and it is a great time for us to connect.

Our church family should be similar—while connections aren't required—we should want to have a relationship with those around us. If you notice that someone you normally see at church hasn't been there for a couple of weeks, it would be great if you would contact them to see if they are okay. If you know that someone is sick or is having a difficult time, please let them know that you are praying for them. Sometimes all it takes



is a quick text to let them know that they are being remembered. Phone calls, cards, e-mails or texts, and of course, in person visits—they are all ways of showing how special each person is to us and to our Lord. Are you willing to help all of us become more connected with each other?

West Hills has a group of Caregiving Ambassadors who periodically make contact with church members who are not actively involved in the life of the church. They reach out with cards, calls, or e-mails. Come when you can. Come every month. We will enjoy a dessert, sweet fellowship, a relevant devotion, and meaningful discussion. God will be there and you are invited to show up too! Session passed the following motions during the Regular Monthly Meeting held on September 20, 2022.

- Approve and authorize un-budgeted expenses of up to \$40,000 from the Operating/ General Fund and or Memorial Fund to meet selected costs to enable Atonement Child Care (ACC) to effectively launch and operate within WHC building/space. When our Ministry Teams were asked to provide recommendations for greater utilization of our facility, they highly recommended a childcare/ preschool. Atonement Child Care (ACC) is a strong faith-based organization that has been offering quality childcare for over 20 years. Utilization of space and related rent helps support maintenance costs of building and incremental revenue and will provide opportunity to build new relationships. Most of these improvements would likely be necessary for West Hills in the near future regardless of our partnership with ACC. ACC has committed to make significant, nonrefundable contributions to the cost of these improvements. The team is also pursuing multiple grants from our larger denomination.
- Approve the Building Use/Facility Stewardship Committee to act on behalf of WHC to enter, and execute, a lease agreement with ACC.
- Dissolved the Racial Justice and Reconciliation Task Force and to have the "RJR Task Force join the Mission Ministry Team and be renamed the Matthew 25 Committee".
- Approve the Designated Giving Policy. Following discussion, a motion was made to withdraw the motion and send the policy back to committee for review and rewrite. The motion was seconded.

Session also discussed the condition of the building and reviewed a list of the maintenance and improvements necessary and associated costs.

Adaima church is doing well and has sent us an update regarding their progress in 2022. We also wanted to let everyone know we sent \$1,000 from the Spirit Fund to continue to help them finish construction on their church building. Thank you for your faithful giving that has allowed us to continue to provide support to Adaima church.

About the building: What's finished: church façade, worship hall on the first floor, and bathrooms and the kitchen on the first floor.

Encouraging news: After weeks and months of prayers, God healed a woman who was diagnosed with cancer. Glory be to God.

#### Challenges and prayers:

- » May the ministry continue to grow and expand.
- » May God provide the financial means to finish the building.
- » May the number of male servants increase because it's a need.










- » All meetings are on regular basis; Christmas celebration was quite special this year as it was in the new hall, despite the fact that it's not finished yet. The congregation was overjoyed and thanked God for His great work among His people. It was a 4-hour celebration that included worship, drama, scripture reading, and sharing testimonies.
- » The church also celebrated Easter together after a long week filled with prayers, fasting, and morning and evening services.
- » In cooperation with some ministers from Cairo and Minya, the church has organized two spiritual gatherings for the kids. The days included: singing songs, prayer, short drama, Bible study, and games followed by reflections. The same gatherings were also organized for middle and high school meeting attendees.
- » The church organized a kids festival in the Hager Adaima area, aiming to serve kids in other places. The program helped the kids emotionally, physically, and spiritually.
- » In its pursuit to strengthen the relations, the church organized a fun day for all the families in Isna.
- » Women's meeting has organized a spiritual fun day for women at the park in Isna, during which they enjoyed hearing the word of God and the fellowship of each other.
- » 6 leaders besides the pastor are still attending leadership training school at Luxor church. The more they change through the teaching, the more they become effective in their ministries.
- » The church enjoyed participating in POMC's annual prayer conference; it was held in Luxor church this year.
- » The church also participates in all the conferences held by Olya presbytery whether it's general, teens, girls, women, or kids' conferences. This kind of participation increases the sense of belonging to the bigger entity.
- » In cooperation with ministers from Cairo, the church organized a 3-day outreach convoy twice. By the grace of the Lord, they reached out to new families and held spiritual revival meetings. As a result, new members joined the church. Shortterm mission trip: - Some of the church leaders along with Rev. Shenouda, traveled to South Sudan for 11 days. During the trip, Adaima church trained the pastors of the Sudanese church and provided theological teachings. They also shared the message of salvation with the families, served kids, and visited the displaced camps.

At the center of many gatherings is food. We can't seem to get together without having a meal as part of the experience. I think it gives us a reason to circle round, slow down, and share life with one another. This scone recipe is easy and would be lovely to serve for company or at Sunday brunch.



Grant's Red Velvet Scones

This recipe calls for Red Velvet cake mix but you can use whatever kind of cake mix you prefer.

Ingredients:

16.5 oz. package Red Velvet cake mix
2 tablespoons buttermilk, plus more for brushing
1 egg, beaten
flour, for dusting
sugar, for sprinkling

#### Preparation

Preheat oven to 400 F.

In a medium bowl, mix together cake mix, buttermilk and egg. The mixture should be pretty dry but come together when pressed with your hands. If it's too dry, add a little more buttermilk.

Dump the mixture out onto a sheet of parchment paper, dust with flour and form it into a ball. Flatten the ball into a 10-inch circle. Cut the circle into 8 triangular pieces. Place the scones onto a parchment-lined sheet tray.
